

Faculty of Health Sciences



Faculty of Natural and Agricultural Sciences








Prof Thuthukile Jita


Matheko Thamae






Ninette Aucamp

His work notably investigates operator semigroups and time-dependent dynamical systems, with real-world applications such as predatorprey dynamics and tumor growth.

His contributions are globally recognised and he is currently preparing a book on bicontinuous semigroups, which will be published by Birkhäuser.

Prof Danre Strydom

Professor Danrè Strydom, woodwind lecturer at the Odeion School of Music at the University of the Free State, is one of South Africa's leading solo, chamber, and orchestral musicians. After attending the Interlochen Arts Camp, USA, she began her formal studies with Heinrich Armer at the UFS. She continued her studies at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music and holds three Master's Degrees from the Royal Conservatory at Ghent University. Prof Strydom completed her PhD in Clarinet Performance at the UFS and received numerous awards, including the ATKV Cultural Diversity Award, FAK Music Award, R. Muller Award for Cultural and Academic



Excellence, and the First National Bank Prize of Excellence. From 2009 to 2013, Prof Strydom performed on clarinet and bass clarinet with the award-winning Brussels Philharmonic, is a Bujet Crampon Artist, and currently serves as the Continental Chair of the International Clarinet Association.

Faculty of Law


Danie Brand is a Professor and Director of the Free State Centre for Human Rights at the University of the Free State. Before joining UFS, he spent 24 years as an academic at the Faculty of Law at the University of Pretoria. His expertise lies in constitutional and administrative law, as well as constitutional theory. Prof Brand's research and publications focus on the relationship between law and poverty, specifically how the law regulates, enables, and limits access to essential livelihood resources like housing, food, water, land, healthcare, and education. His commitment to this area extends into legal practice, where he runs a human rights impact litigation practice as an advocate, concentrating on access to these basic resources. He has also occasionally served as a judge in the High Courts of Pretoria and Johannesburg.

Prof Maryke Labuschagne

Maryke Labuschagne is a Professor of Plant Breeding in the Department of Plant Sciences at the University of the Free State and leads the NRF South African Research Chairs Initiative (SARChI) in disease resistance and quality in field crops. For the past 30 years, she has trained PhD students from across Africa, serving as the main supervisor for 69 and co-supervisor for 12 PhD students from countries such as Cameroon, Ethiopia, and SADC nations. She has also supervised 54 MSc students. Prof Labuschagne and her students have published 278 papers, mainly in ISI-listed journals, with a research focus on improving the nutritional value of food security crops in Africa in the context of climate change.

Mikateko Mathebula, an Associate Professor and Y2-rated scholar, researches students' experiences in higher

education and how inequalities affect their human flourishing. Faith Mkwananzi, also an Associate Professor and a Y1-rated scholar, focuses on arts-based participatory methodologies and youth experiences both in and out of higher education.

Prof Elizabeth Erasmus, Prof Marietjie Schutte-Smith, and Prof Deon Visser, all from the Chemistry department, comprise the original team. The expanded interdisciplinary team includes Dr Anwar Noreljaleel, Prof Vladimir Azov, Prof Anke Wilhelm, and Prof Karel von Eschwege from Chemistry, Dr Lisa Rothman from Plant Science, Dr Mariana Erasmus from the Centre for Mineral and Biogeochemistry, and two social scientists, Prof Katinka de Wet and Dr Nola Redelinghuys. Their research spans several areas, including extracting chitin from mushroom mycelia using eco-friendly methods, gold extraction from e-waste (with a registered patent), menstrual health management and designing reusable sanitary pads with antimicrobial properties, creating super

absorbent polymers from waste materials for agricultural use, developing new fertilisers and methods to combat stem rot in crops, establishing a Small Molecule Manufacturing Laboratory, and creating antimicrobial paints.

Prof Hendrik C. Swart, a B1 NRF-rated researcher and Senior Professor in the Department of Physics at the University of the Free State, leads a prominent research group on Luminescent and Advanced Materials. 

Exceptional Established Achievers

Prof Lochner Marais

Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences

Lochner Marais is a Professor of Development Studies at the Centre for Development Support, University of the Free State, and an honorary professor at the Sustainable Minerals Institute, University of Queensland, Australia. He is the executive editor of Research Directions: Mine Closure and Transitions by Cambridge University Press and serves on the editorial boards of Habitat International and Sustainable Cities and Society. His work focuses on the social consequences of mine closures, place attachment related to mining, and the link between mine closure and social disruption. As the first researcher to link mine closure and social disruption, he warns against dependencies on mining booms and identifies mine closure as the 6th phase of boomtown development.





Prof John Mubangizi

Faculty of Law

John C. Mubangizi is a Research Professor at the Free State Centre for Human Rights in the Faculty of Law at the University of the Free State. He joined the UFS as Dean of the Faculty of Law at UFS from 2018 to 2023 after serving as Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Head of the College of Law & Management Studies at the University of KwaZulu-Natal from 2007 to 2017. He is the author of The Protection of Human Rights in South Africa: A Legal and Practical Guide (2004, 2013) and has published extensively. Prof Mubangizi, NRF-rated since 2005 with a current C2 rating, is a Member of the Academy of Science of South Africa (ASSAf) and served on its council from 2012 to 2015. He also chaired the Higher Education Quality Committee (HEQC) and served on the Council on Higher Education (CHE) from 2015 to 2018.

Prof Kobus Marais

Kobus Marais is a Professor of Translation Studies at the University of the Free State, Bloemfontein and his research focuses on translation studies, semiotics, biosemiotics, complexity theory, and development studies. He has authored three monographs: Translation Theory and Development Studies: A Complexity Theory Approach (2014), A (Bio)Semiotic Theory of Translation: The Emergence of Social-Cultural Reality (2018), and Trajectories of Translation: The Thermodynamics of Semiosis (2023), along with the edited volume Translation Beyond Translation Studies (2022).
