PROF CHAKA CHAKA (RSA)

rofessor Chaka Chaka is a Full Professor in the Department

of English Studies, College of Human Sciences, at the University of South Africa (UNISA, Pretoria), South Africa. He previously lectured at four South African universities. His research interests include the following areas: language studies; language and decoloniality; language and education; literacies; computer-mediated communication (CMC); electronic learning (e-learning); computer assisted language learning (CALL); mobile learning (m-learning); mobile assisted language learning (MALL); and technology-enhanced learning. He has published 58 research outputs, 23 of which are edited book chapters, and 35 of which are journal articles. In the last 2¹/₄ years (from January 2021 to 24 March 2023) alone, he published 16 research outputs. All together, his research outputs have 482 Google Scholar citations, 321 ResearchGate citations, and 208 Semantic Scholar citations. At the moment, he has two research outputs accepted for publication in 2023. Currently, he is a reviewer of 10 scholarly journals, and a selection review editor of Frontiers in Education's Digital Learning Innovations. He has co-guest-edited two special issues titled: "Multilingualism and translanguaging in higher education institutions: The nexus between Englishes, and other languages including English" in the journal, Scrutiny 2; and "Towards a SoTL embracing critical southern paradigms and frameworks in higher education: Curriculum innovations, flexible pedagogies, and teaching and learning support technologies from the Global South" in the Journal of Contemporary Issues in Education. Presently, he is co-guestediting a special issue titled, "Language(ing), multilingualism, diversity, equity, social justice, and language activism". Previously, he was a reviewer of edited book chapters and served as a member of advisory boards of 12 edited books. Finally, Prof. Chaka has some keen interest in the pros and cons of generative AI tools such as ChatGPT in the higher education landscape. To this end, he has submitted two journal articles on generative AI tools: one focuses solely on ChatGPT; and the other one deals with three generative AI tools.



DR ZHONGFENG TIAN (USA)

r. Zhongfeng Tian is Assistant Professor of TESOL/Applied Linguistics in the Department of Bicultural-Bilingual Studies at the University of Texas at San Antonio, USA. He holds a Ph.D. degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Boston College. Theoretically grounded in translanguaging, his research centers on teacher-researcher collaborations to create equitable and inclusive learning environments in ESL/bilingual education contexts and the preparation of culturally and linguistically competent teachers with social justice orientations in higher education. Dr. Tian has published extensively in the field of ESL/bilingual education and teacher education, including four books (with Multilingual Matters, Springer, and De Gruyter Mouton), five special issues and numerous articles which can be found at International Journal of Bilingual Education and Bilingualism, Journal of Multilingual and Multicultural Development, Journal of Language, Identity & Education, TESOL Quarterly, to name a few. Most recently, based on his scholarly contributions in Chinese-English bilingual education, Dr. Tian has received an Early Career Award from ACTFL (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) Research SIG.

r Vimbai Hungwe is a sociolinguist who holds a PhD from the University of Limpopo. Having attained her PhD qualification in 2019 after completing it in record 2 years, Dr Hungwe works as a senior lecturer at Sefako Makgatho University of health Sciences. Her areas of interest are multilingualism, translanguaging and translingual pedagogy. Dr Hungwe, fell in love with translanguaging in 2014 when the pedagogic strategy hit the research front. She grabbed the teaching strategy which formed the basis of her PhD research, and she has been using it in her teaching and her research. With a total of 17 research publications and 1 co-edited volume, Dr Hungwe focus is multilingualism and translanguaging.
