IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS:

- <u>Closing dates:</u> Your admission application MUST be processed before you register in 2018. When we process your application for admission, we capture your details onto the UFS databases if your details are not there, you cannot register. For this reason, it is very important to stick to the closing dates.
- <u>National Senior Certificate</u>: If you already have a National Senior Certificate (NSC), you must include a certified copy with your application form.
- <u>Application</u>: Make sure that you complete the application properly, and attach and certify all the required documents. Gaps in the application, and missing or uncertified documents will delay your application process.
- <u>Transferring students</u>: If you transfer from another tertiary institution, you must include a certificate of conduct and an official study record from the previous tertiary institution with your application, AND submit copies when you register. The closing date for students transferring from other tertiary institutions is 30 September 2017.
- <u>International students:</u> If you are from another country, you must attach your certified school leaving certificate, diplomas, and proof of a conditional exemption certificate issued by the Matriculation Board (Higher Education of South Africa) to your application. The closing date for international students is 30 September 2017.

If we receive your application after 30 September 2017, it will be a <u>late application</u> and will be processed separately. Therefore, you may have difficulty with financial assistance, residence placement, access to the University Access Programme (UAP), and others.



Higher Education South Africa (HESA) sets specific admission requirements that you must meet if you want to study at any South African university. In most cases, an admission point (AP) of 30 is accepted, but there are exceptions where a higher point is required, or where a lower point is acceptable. If you finished school in or after 2008, and have a National Senior Certificate (NSC), you need the following to apply for admission to a Bachelor's Degree at any South African university:



Four (4) of the seven (7) subjects included in your NSC subject package must be from the designated subjects listed below, with a minimum mark of 4 (50%) in each of these four (4) subjects:

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO STUDY AT THE UFS?

In addition, for degree studies, the UFS expects that:

- · You have an overall AP of 30 and a minimum achievement level of 4 (50%) in the chosen UFS language of instruction (note that certain programmes require a higher AP or achievement level); and
- · You must pass certain school subjects with a minimum level of achievement in order to take a specific university module. For example, you must get a mark of 70% for Mathematics in Grade 12 if you are planning to take Mathematics as one of the modules in a Bachelor of Science (BSc) study path; and
- · You must have an overall AP of 30 to register.



HOW DO YOU CALCULATE YOUR AP SCORE?

- An AP score consisting of seven levels is used. Points will be awarded for six academic subjects (note: no points will be awarded for achievement points lower than 30%).
- · Language of instruction (English) on a minimum achievement level 4 (50%).
- · UPP requires a minimum achievement level 3: English (40–49%). (Please refer to specific faculty requirements.)

Important information:

- · Administration fee: A non-refundable annual administrative fee is charged on all international student accounts.
- · Closing date: Closing date for applications by international students is 30 September 2017.
- <u>Visa:</u> You must have a VALID study visa before you can enter South Africa. Make sure your study visa is issued for study at the UFS, and not any other institution in South Africa. You must have a valid and appropriate/correct visa to be registered at the UFS.
- <u>Medical aid</u>: You must be a member of a medical aid registered in terms of the Medical Aid Schemes Act 1998 of South Africa as required by the South African Immigration Act. It is important that your medical aid cover MUST be valid for the duration of your studies at the UFS. No travel insurance or hospital plans will be accepted.

COMPULSORY NATIONAL BENCHMARK TESTS (NBTS)

What are the NBTs?

Higher Education South Africa (HESA) initiated the NBTs that several South African universities use as part of their student placement processes. The first test is the Academic and Quantitative Literacy Test (AQL), and the second is the Mathematics Test (MAT). Each test takes three hours to complete.

Is it compulsory to take the NBT tests?

Yes, all first-time entry undergraduate applicants to the University of the Free State must write the NBTs before registering.

Must I write both tests?

It depends. ALL prospective students must write the AQL test. If you apply to the Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences, the Faculty of Natural and Agricultural Sciences, or the Faculty of Health Sciences, you must write both the AQL and MAT tests.

Why write the NBTs?

The level of academic reading and writing that you must be able to master at university, is very different from what you are used to at school. If you lack this level of skills, you may have a hard time at university. But if we know what the level of your skills are, we can make sure that you enrol for the most appropriate modules and programmes in your first year. And that is what we use the NBTs for – to help us understand what skills you have, and what skills need to be developed.

How, when, and where to write?

You should write the NBTs while you are in Grade 12, before you register at the university. Visit www.nbt.ac.za for all the information you need. Once you have written the tests, you can use the results to apply to any university. The UFS only accepts NBT results, NO other admission tests will be considered.

How does the UFS make use of the NBT results?

In two ways:

- We use it as part of the selection process for the Faculty of Health Sciences (School of Medicine and School of Allied Health Professions).
- If you apply to any of our other faculties (including Nursing), we use NBT results during the registration process, but not for admission decisions.

Generally, we use NBT performance levels to place first-year students into appropriate programmes or modules. If you did not pass the NBT Academic Literacy Test and want to study in English, you must register for one of the following academic literacy development modules in English: EALH/EALE/EALN/EALL 1508. The same applies if you want to study in Afrikaans (if offered in the relevant faculty), but did not pass the Academic Literacy Tests – in which case you must register for one of the academic literacy development courses in Afrikaans: AGAH/AGAM/AGAL/AGAN/AGAE 1508.

These academic literacy development courses are not language courses. It teaches you to read academic text efficiently and critically, while extracting the main ideas and key details. This skill will help you to adequately demonstrate your knowledge in tests and exams. It will also teach you to write academic essays and assignments. Overall, it will give you the confidence to perform at your best, academically.

NB: If you have not written the NBTs yet, please register to write as soon as possible.

What is the proficiency / pass score?

Academic Literacy (AL) = 64% Quantitative Literacy (QL) = 70% Mathematics Test (MAT) = 68%

What does it cost to write?

Couldn't get university admission? It does not have to be the end of the road for you. Do you have an AP of at least 18? In that case, you can get access to mainstream studies if you meet the minimum requirements of: the University Access Programme (UAP), OR higher certificates in Economic and Management Sciences, OR higher certificate in Humanities.

The programme provides prospective students an opportunity to enjoy studies at higher-education institutions after successful completion of an access year.

What is the UAP?

We introduced this programme to assist many deserving students who do not meet our admission requirements. There are four study options:

- Economic and Management Sciences
- Human and Social Sciences
- · Natural Sciences and Agricultural Sciences
- Education

If you complete any of these options successfully, you can get access to almost any mainstream course – if you meet the specific admission requirements of that course. During your access year, you will get more than just academic information. We address a wider scope of needs to help you prepare for higher-education studies. In the Skills and Competencies in Lifelong Learning course, you will learn skills to help you with problem solving, self-assertiveness, and other generic competencies. An academic literacy course will also improve your academic reading and writing skills.

Who may participate in the programme?

It is an open facility that welcomes all applicants who could not obtain access to a higher-education institution, including the University of the Free State.



Academic merit bursaries for new first-year students

The university reserves the right to amend the regulations and bursary values and/or conditions applicable to the awarding of bursaries without prior notice.

If you qualify for an academic merit bursary, we will credit your class fee account with the amount of the bursary after you register as a student at the University of the Free State.

Students from the University Access Programmes

Academic merit bursaries will be awarded to students from the University Access Programmes. The calculation for the merit bursaries only applies to the courses offered by the University of the Free State.

What does this mean? You cannot use the bursary at any other institution.

· First-year students who first registered at other higher-education institutions

First-time entering first-year students who first registered at other higher-education institutions, discontinued their studies and then register at the University of the Free State, will not qualify for academic merit bursaries during their first year of study.

What does this mean? If you transfer to the UFS from another university during your first year, you cannot get an academic merit

bursary during that year.

· Interruption of studies

To qualify for an academic merit bursary, a student must register at the University of the Free State as a student again. If there is an interruption of more than five (5) years between the last examination (matric or university) and the year in which the bursary must be awarded, the student does not qualify for a bursary.

What does this mean? If you interrupt your studies for more than five (5) years, you will lose the academic merit bursary.

Discontinuation of study

If a student discontinues his course during the year, the bursary will be recovered pro rata.

What does this mean? If you have a bursary and stop studying, you must pay back the portion of the bursary that you used.

· Final-year students

Students qualifying for the academic merit bursary at the end of their final year of study need to register for a degree at the UFS within five (5) years. If a student does not register within five (5) years from their final year of study, the academic bursary will be forfeited. What does this mean? An academic bursary is only valid for five (5) years. If you re-register after five (5) years, you must pay class fees.

· Payment of academic merit bursaries

Students who qualify for an academic merit bursary will have the bursary amount credited to their class fee account after registration at the UFS. What does this mean? You will not get cash; the money will be paid into your student account at the UFS.

Undertaking

The student undertakes to complete his/her degree studies at this university. If he/she does not complete the course, Council reserves the right to claim back the entire bursary amount or the part thereof that may already have been paid out. However, each case will be treated on merit. A bursary may be withdrawn at any time if the behaviour, diligence, or progress of the student is found to be unsatisfactory. If the examination results of a bursar are such that he/she will have to repeat the studies of a full year/semester, the bursary will be regarded as a study loan and it will have to be paid back. What does this mean? If you get an academic merit bursary from the UFS, you can only complete your studies at the UFS. If you don't complete the qualification, you may have to pay back all the money, or some of it. It depends on your specific situation. If you do not perform well academically, or behave badly, you may lose the bursary.

· Occasional studies

Students who register for occasional studies do not qualify for merit bursaries based on their academic achievement of the previous year or academic achievements during their occasional studies.

· BML (Bachelor in Management Leadership)

Students who register for BML studies do not qualify for merit bursaries based on academic achievements during their BML studies.



PAYMENTS IN ADVANCE BEFORE YOU CAN REGISTER AS A STUDENT

Payments prior to registration:

Registration for first-semester and year modules takes place during January – February 2018.

Conditions and amounts payable before registration can take place:

First semester: Registration for first-semester and year modules takes place during January-February.

- Prepayments must be paid five (5) working days before you register. You will not be able to register until these amounts reflect as credits on your tuition fee accounts. If your tuition fees are less than the amounts required, you must only pay the full tuition amount. (Including the registration fee and foreign admin fee if applicable).
- For the amounts that must be paid before you register, visit www.ufs.ac.za and follow the links: Students -Tuition Fees Payments prior to registration.

Second semester: Registration for second-semester modules takes place in July.

- South African students: Payments prior to registration for the second semester are the same as for the first semester.
- International students: International students must pay all fees for the second semester in advance before registration can take place.

Students receiving Financial Aid (SA students only)

If you receive financial aid (bursary/loans), and the bursary or loan covers all fees for the year, the amount payable before registration will be reduced by the amount of the financial aid. If your bursary or loan does not cover all fees for the year, you must still pay the prepayment before you register. The amount payable must reflect as a credit balance on your tuition fee account before you will be allowed to continue with registration.

Please fax proof of your bursaries/loans to +27 58 718 5353 five (5) working days before you register. You must bring the original proof of your bursary/loan with you when you register.

NB: We would like to bring to your attention that no money will be accepted at the Rolihlahla Mandela Hall during the registration process due to security reasons.



Payment dates:

Tuition and residence fees are calculated per semester. All fees must be paid as follows, regardless of whether or not an account was received. (It is your responsibility to supply the university with your correct contact details and to make enquiries should you not receive an account.)

Payment dates for South African students:

First semester: all fees for the first semester are payable on/before 31 March. Second semester: all fees for the second semester are payable on/before 31 August.

Payment dates for international students:

First semester: all fees for the first semester are payable on/before 31 March.

Second semester: all fees for the second semester are payable on/before 30 June, regardless of any other date which may appear on account statements.

All other fees are payable no later than the end of the month, following the month in which the transaction took place, as indicated on the account statement, unless specifically stipulated otherwise in the regulations.

If payments are not made by due dates:

Interest at the prime bake rate as charged by ABSA Bank + 2% will be levied on all accounts in arrears;

All academic records will be withheld; and

Discount on early payments (SA students only)

Discount is given on early payment of tuition fee accounts. Standard discount is given annually and is as follows:

- 5% when all fees for the whole year is paid before 28 February
- 2½% when all first-semester fees are paid before 28 February

Discounts are not given automatically. You must apply for discounts in writing. Discounts are only given on module and accommodation fees charged. If you receive any form of financial aid from the UFS on tuition and/or accommodation fees, you do not qualify to claim this discount.

Bursaries and loans:

IMPORTANT: If you have a bursary or loan, it is your responsibility to ensure that the bursary donors make payments on time, and in accordance with university regulations. You must make sure that you provide your sponsors with the correct details of your account. If your sponsor does not pay your account in time, interest will be charged and debited to the account, and you or your parents or guardian will be responsible for the payment of such interest.

The cost per programme is the average cost per year.

Tuition fees are charged per module.

Programme prices vary according to the modules registered for.

International non-SADC students pay the actual module price + 50%.

Notes and study material

Study material/notes are automatically prepared when you register, and charged accordingly. It is your responsibility to collect the study material. If you cancel/discontinue any of the modules, you will not be refunded for the notes and study material.

Books

Money for books can be paid into a separate account in advance. The amount paid will be transferred to your student card.

At the end of each academic year, the credit available on your book money account will automatically be transferred to your tuition fees account.

Student card

Your student card is your key to all kinds of services and events at the UFS. It is your official university identification and, as a student or employee, you must carry it with you whenever you are on campus. Your electronic student card is for your use only, nobody else may use it. Your personal details are associated with your card and are unique to your card.

Parking disc

To park in designated parking spaces allocated to students, you must buy a parking permit/disc at Traffic Services by the end of February. It must be displayed on the windshield of your vehicle.



RESIDENCE ACCOMMODATION FEES

You or your parent/guardian or both are responsible for the full accommodation fee for the accommodation period.

Tariffs for accommodation in the different residences and living units are available on request. For accommodation fees, visit www.ufs. ac.za and follow the links Students-Tuition Fees-Quotation. Fees are also published in the fees yearbook.

NB: Residential students must familiarise themselves with all policies regarding accommodation.

Reservation deposit (first placement in residence)

When you accept the accommodation offer, you must pay the reservation deposit.

Rules regarding deposits

You will forfeit the deposit you paid if accommodation has been allocated to you and a place has thus been reserved for you, when:

- · you do not show up, or
- · you cancel your place after 31 December.

The reservation deposit may be used at the sole discretion of the university to recover any contingencies resulting in costs, losses, damages, penalties, etc.

The reservation deposit will ONLY be refunded if you:

- do not comply with admission requirements;
- are not selected for a specific course;
- pass away;
- submit a satisfactory medical certificate as motivation for cancellation;
- leave at the end of the term of accommodation.

The deposit will be transferred to your tuition fees account, and if this results in a credit on the account, the credit may be paid out on request.

Accommodation costs in case of cancellation of studies

If you stay in a residence and cancel your courses, the actual accommodation cost up to the date of vacating the residence is payable.

Family discount on tuition and/or accommodation fees (SA students only)

If three or more students – who are dependents from the same family (children, stepchildren, adopted children, but excluding children-in-law or married children) – study at the university and/or stay in university residences at the same time, the following discount will be granted on the amount payable for residing in a UFS residence, and on modules the students are registered for:

Three students: 10%

Four or more students: 15%

Discounts will be granted on the following conditions:

- A discount may only be claimed for full-time undergraduate SA students.
- All dependents must be under the age of 26.
- Students receiving any form of financial aid for tuition and/or accommodation fees do not qualify for this discount.
- The discount will be recalculated if one or more of the students discontinue their studies, or leave the residence.
- Family discounts are not given automatically. You must apply for family discount in writing, and must present evidence of relationships.

 The full particulars of the students concerned must be submitted.
- A discount may only be claimed for the current academic year.
- Family discount will only be given on module and accommodation fees.

Discount on early payments (SA students only)

Discount is given on early payment of tuition fee accounts. Standard discount is given annually and is as follows:

- 5% when all fees for the whole year are paid before 28 February.
- 2½% when all first-semester fees are paid before 28 February.

The following condition for granting this discount will be applicable:

Students who receive any form of financial aid from the UFS on tuition and/or accommodation fees, do not qualify to claim this discount.

Discounts are not given automatically. Students have to apply for discounts in writing. Discounts will be given only on the following fees:

- Module fees
- Accommodation fees

Additional late registration fee

If you attend lectures in a course for which you are not registered, you will have to pay an additional amount per module if approval is granted for registration after the final registration date. The fee is payable in addition to the tuition fees for the course.

Matriculation exemption

All prospective students applying for conditional matriculation exemption on the strength of tertiary qualifications with a view to admission to the university, have to pay the amount required by the Joint Matriculation Board.

Student card

Your student card is your key to all kinds of services and events at the UFS. It is your official university identification and, as a student or employee, you are required to carry it with you whenever you are on campus. An electronic student card is for the student's personal use only and must not be used by other persons. Your personal details are associated with your card and are unique to your card.

ON-CAMPUS RESIDENCES (HOUSING AND RESIDENCE AFFAIRS)

Residence Accommodation: Junior/Senior Residences

The accommodation agreement that you entered into with the UFS will, subject to other stipulations or regulations as approved by the Council from time to time, be binding for the full accommodation period. You, or your parent/guardian, or both are responsible for the full accommodation fee for the accommodation period.

Accommodation at the UFS will become your second home, and life in a student residence can be a very exciting and rewarding experience. If you are accepted into one of our residences, you will benefit from a completely new world of friendships that can last for a lifetime. There are many people from different language, racial, and cultural backgrounds on campus. Living and learning in this diverse environment could give you a definite advantage over many other jobseekers once you graduate and will help you later in life. Our residences are very popular, with a waiting list of applicants. Therefore, you should apply as soon as possible if you want to secure a place.

The leadership of residence communities consists of a Residence Head, Prime, Residence Committee, and Peer Mentors. This leadership team creates a residence environment where every student feels welcome and inspired. All residence communities are driven by a set of shared values, which mediates a culture of mutual accountability.

First-year students are supported in their transition to higher education by means of a Peer Mentor system in residences. Each first-year student is allocated to a Peer Mentor who facilitates individual conversation as well as conversations in small group format with students.

Application for residences

- To be one of the residents, you need to:
- · Complete the application form for admission, as well as the application form for residences as soon as possible.
- Ensure that the forms are completed correctly in order to avoid delays.
- Keep your reservation deposit ready in case you are selected for placement in a residence (refer to the placement procedure on the application form).
- Take note of the Academic Admission criteria for residences. Make sure that your AP meets the criteria.
- Indicate your involvement/achievement in leadership, culture, and sport.

Placement policy

It is very important to take note of the following academic requirements for junior residences on the main campus:

- A minimum Grade 12 admission point of 30 is required for admission to a residence.
- Your academic merit is determined based on the most recent admission point as calculated by the university (whether Grade 11 or Grade 12 point).
- If you were admitted to a residence based on the Grade 11 point and the Grade 12 point is less than 30, your admission to a residence will be cancelled.
- If your current admission point is less than 30, you can still apply for residence accommodation. You will qualify for admission to a residence (subject to availability) if your final Grade 12 admission point is 30 or more.
- If you are currently in the University Access Programme (UAP), you will qualify for admission to a residence if you pass all your modules.
- If you were registered at the UFS or another tertiary institution for the second or subsequent years, you must have passed at least 120 credits to qualify for admission to a residence. Current first-year students will qualify for admission to a residence based on their Grade 12 admission point.

General admission requirements:

To place balanced students in residences, the highest level of achievement in respect of leadership, culture, and sport is taken into account and calculated as follows:

School level = 4 points
Provincial = 8 points
National = 12 points
International = 16 points

The application point is calculated by obtaining the total of the admission point (weighted at 2/3) and general admission point (weighted at 1/3).

HIV/AIDS UNIT

The unit was established to coordinate and oversee all HIV/Aids programmes for the campus community, as well as the nearby local community.

HIV/Aids Unit services/activities

Voluntary counselling and testing (VCT)

This service is offered by the unit's professional nurse by appointment.

Awareness campaigns

The unit organises the following awareness events:

- Evening information sessions for students. Students sit together and discuss issues that involve them, real challenges that predispose them to HIV and other STIs, including unplanned pregnancy.
- · Condom bash targets students in the beginning of the year and highlights the significance of using protection during sex, as condoms serve a dual purpose.
- · VCT awareness campaigns are conducted on a quarterly basis as an endeavour to reach out to a larger community.

Counselling services

The HIV/Aids Unit coordinator conducts one-to-one counselling for individual clients per request.

Establishment of support groups

· Ongoing support is provided for all people who are either infected or affected by the pandemic and these sessions are facilitated by the unit's coordinator.

Lunch-hour debates/dialogues

· These sessions are mainly targeted at staff members, and stimulating and empowering topics are discussed.

Workshops/training

Short courses on subjects such as ARVs, PMTCT, STIs, and basic HIV/Aids are conducted by the programme coordinator for students
and staff members.

Other means of disseminating information include:

· Talk shows, posters, pamphlets, dramas, and poetry.

The unit oversees the student peer educators/Transformers programme. A team of eight student peer educators/transformers disseminates information to their peers, which is very convenient, because they speak the same language and share similar challenges.

Commemoration of specific HIV/Aids and other STI events according to the calendar of the Department of Health. The unit takes the lead in organising events such as World Aids Day, Candlelight, as well as Condom Week.

Community project involvement

The HIV/Aids Unit, in collaboration with student peer educators, visit identified schools around Qwaqwa, equipping both Grade 11 and 12 learners with life skills.

Presentations on relevant topics for young people include:

- · Transition from high school to university life
- Life choices and decision-making
- · The ABC approach

Accidents

As the university only insures its own risks, it cannot be held liable for accidents that happen to students. It is therefore recommended that students take out personal accident insurance.

Damage to students' personal possessions

The university cannot be held liable for loss or damage to students' personal possessions. Residence students also leave their possessions in the residences during the holidays at their own risk. It is therefore recommended that students insure their possessions. Protect yourself and the property of the university. Any damage and/or theft must be reported to the Protection Services Division. Distinguish between fun and crime, and respect other people's property.

Vehicles on campus

It is recommended that students who keep vehicles on campus take out SASRIA (riot insurance). All students and members of the public who wish to use the roads on campus, should purchase an access disk issued by the Protection Services Division of the university. The disc must be displayed on the windscreen.

If you do not have an access permit, you could receive a traffic fine. People using the roads on the university campus or park on the campus, do so at their own risk and the university does not accept any responsibility for any accident, loss or damage. Any damage or theft must be reported to the Security Services Division.



University:

An institution of advanced study and research in the arts and sciences where the highest possible academic qualification can be obtained.

Rector:

The Rector is the Chief Executive Officer of the university, with Vice-Rectors supporting him.

University Council:

The University Council is the highest decision-making body of the university. The Council consists of representatives of the university, the Students' Representative Council (SRC), church and community representatives, prominent business people, and individuals appointed by the government.

Chancellor:

The Chancellor is the ceremonial head of the university and is generally a prominent figure in society. Our Chancellor is Dr Khotso Mokhele.



Faculty:

The students, lecturers, research and management of a group of departments who (in a broad sense) work in the same field of study, form a faculty. The Qwaqwa Campus has four faculties of academic excellence. They are:

- Economic and Management Sciences
- Education
- · The Humanities
- · Natural and Agricultural Sciences

The head of a faculty is called a dean and resides at the Bloemfontein Campus. At the Qwaqwa Campus, faculty heads are called programme heads and the subject head is responsible for the management of departments.

Department:

The students, lecturers, research and management activities in a specific field of study form a department. At the head of a department, we find the departmental head or departmental chairperson. For undergraduate courses, you will be required to attend classes in various departments, while postgraduate studies are generally undertaken in a single department.

Professor:

A person who has distinguished himself/herself as an expert in a specific field of study.

Lecturer:

The name assigned to a person who presents classes to students. Each department has a number of lecturers who are experts in specific fields of study and who are attached full time to the university. Lecturing staff are addressed in terms of their titles.

Kovsie:

The historical word 'Kovsie' is the nickname given to students at the UFS. This is also the general name used for referring to the UFS.

Degree:

An academic achievement that provides evidence that you are academically competent in a specific field of study so that you may embark upon a career or careers related to this field. Undergraduate refers to students who are studying for the first degree, while the term postgraduate refers to students engaged in a study field where they have already obtained a degree. For example, the term degree could denote a BA degree (Baccalaureus Artium), a BCom degree (Baccalaureus Commercii), or a BSc degree (Baccalaureus Scientiae/Bachelor of Science). The minimum period of study for an undergraduate bachelor's degree is generally three or four years. This is followed by an honours degree (generally one or two years) or a master's degree (one or more years) and finally a doctorate (generally two years or longer). Some degrees lead directly into certain professions, while other degrees provide general preparation for a variety of careers. A general BCom degree will equip you with the necessary economic and management knowledge so that, for example, you may apply for a position as a manager in a company.

Module:

A module refers to specific fields of study within a discipline. For example, Financial Management is one of several modules in the field of study known as Business Management.


The Academic Calendar:

An academic year consists of two semesters. The first semester usually commences early in February, and the second semester by the end of July. In between, there is generally a holiday of approximately three weeks. The second semester is concluded at the end of November. Undergraduate students write an examination at the end of each semester. For postgraduate studies, much more self-study and research is expected from students.
