WHAT DO YOU NEED TO STUDY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF THE FREE STATE?

For degree studies at the University of the Free State, we expect that

- you have an NSC or NCV with an endorsement that allows entrance to degree studies (bachelor's degree) or an equivalent qualification;
- you meet all the minimum admission requirements for the programme you intend to study. **Meeting the minimum admission requirements for your chosen/intended programme of study does not guarantee admission, as limited spaces are available in each programme;**
- you have a minimum level of 4 (50%) in English Home Language or English First Additional Language; and
- you must pass certain school subjects with a minimum level of achievement in order to take a certain university module. For example, you must get a minimum mark of 50% for English in Grade 12 if you plan to study Bachelor of Divinity. Please refer to the section on the faculty-specific admission requirements, which also includes the respective compulsory subjects and achievement levels required per programme.

HOW DO YOU APPLY?

Visit <https://apply.ufs.ac.za>. Keep your mobile phone and an active email address ready, as you require both to access and complete the online application form.

Proceed through all the steps and submit your electronic application. Make sure that you complete the application form properly, e.g., if you need on-campus residence accommodation or financial aid, indicate this in the relevant section.

Upload copies of the following in PDF or JPEG format when you apply for undergraduate studies:

- Your ID if you are a South African citizen
- Your passport if you are an international student
- Your parent's ID or passport if you are younger than 18
- Your final Grade 11 results with the school's stamp
- National Senior Certificate (NSC) or Grade 12 IEB certificate if you have already matriculated
- Your academic record, only if you are/were a student at another institution of higher learning
- USAf accreditation from the examination board for South African universities. Apply to mb.usaf.ac.za for conditional exemption, foreign conditional exemption, or mature age conditional exemption. A Universities South Africa (USAf) Certificate of Exemption is required if you do not have an endorsed South African Senior Certificate. If you are eligible for the certificate, but have not yet applied for it, we will assist you with the process. Therefore, you can apply before receiving the required certificate. IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS:

- Limited space: Keep in mind that all programmes have limited space available; therefore, you are encouraged to apply as soon as possible to avoid disappointment. When we process your application for admission, we capture your details onto the UFS databases – if your details are not available, or if you have omitted it on your application form, you will not be admitted or be able to register. For this reason, it is very important to complete the application form in full and to stick to the closing dates. **Meeting the minimum admission requirements for your chosen/intended programme of study does not guarantee admission, as limited space is available in each programme.**
- National Senior Certificate: If you already have a National Senior Certificate (NSC), you must include a copy with your application form.
- Application: Make sure that you complete the application properly and attach all the required documents. An incomplete application, as well as outstanding documents, will delay your application process. Make sure that you complete the application form thoroughly, e.g., your personal details, school performance levels, the correct name of the school you are currently attending or have attended if you have already matriculated; if you need on-campus residence accommodation and/or financial aid, indicate this in the relevant section.
- Transferring students: If you transfer from another tertiary institution, you must include a certificate of conduct and an official study record from the previous tertiary institution with your application.
- International students: If you are from another country, you must attach your certified school-leaving certificate and relevant diplomas. Universities South Africa (USAf) Certificate of Exemption is required if you do not have an endorsed South African Senior Certificate.
 - You can apply at the UFS before receiving the exemption certificate from USAf.
 - If you are an international student who is currently in Grade 12, the UFS may make a conditional offer based on your final Grade 11 results.
 - If you do not have matriculation exemption, the Office for International Affairs will apply for the USAf certificate of exemption. You will have to pay the prescribed fee before the Office for International Affairs attends to the USAf exemption application. You must pay and submit the relevant documentation as soon as you receive the final Grade 12 results.



ADMISSION TO STUDY AT THE UFS

Academic excellence is what the UFS is about – the higher your AP score, the better your chances of being chosen and finally admitted to study. Meeting the minimum admission requirements for your chosen/intended programme of study does not guarantee selection and admission, as all programmes have a limited number of spaces available. Applicants with the highest AP scores are chosen first, and the admission continues until all spaces have been filled. If you do not meet the minimum admission requirements for your intended/chosen programme of study, you will not be selected. Consult the faculty-specific admission requirements for all the programmes you qualify for and apply for the two programmes that best fit your personality, purpose, and passion.

Admission can be a complicated process. To make it easy to understand, the admission process can be summarised in the following steps:



You will be **CONDITIONALLY ADMITTED** based on your Grade 11 or equivalent results, subject to you meeting all the minimum requirements for the intended programme of study. Please note that conditional admission is not applicable to all the selection programmes in the Faculty of Health Sciences.

Your **FINAL ADMISSION** to the programme of your choice will depend on your final Grade 12 results. You will be notified of the university's admission decision immediately after your final Grade 12 results have been released by the Department of Education. Therefore, it is your responsibility to ensure that your contact details on your application form are correct.

Pay attention to the following important information:

- The UFS reserves the right to change the minimum requirements of each programme or any other information without notifying you.
- There are specific admission requirements that you should meet if you want to study at any South African university. If you finished school in or after 2008 and have a National Senior Certificate (NSC), you need to have a performance level of at least 4 (50%) in four (4) of the seven (7) subjects included in your NSC subject package.
- All admission requirements apply to first-year students in 2023.
- Admission to study at the UFS is dependent on the following:
 - Your application should meet all the minimum requirements for the programme
 - The programme must have available space and capacity to admit students
 - You have to submit valid school results with your application
- Applications for all non-selection programmes close on 30 September 2022.

An admission point (AP) consisting of seven levels is used. Points will be awarded for six academic modules.

Note: No points will be awarded for achievement levels lower than 30%:

One point is awarded for Life Orientation (LO) from achievement Level 5 (60%) or higher.

The UFS makes every effort to ensure that the information provided in this faculty programme booklet is accurate and up to date at the time of going to press. However, it may be necessary for the UFS to make some changes to the information presented in the faculty programme booklet following publication – for example, where it is necessary to reflect changes in policy, practice, or theory, or if an accrediting body necessitates requirements to be amended. Furthermore, certain programmes may only be offered if there are a sufficient number of applicants.



EXTENDED CURRICULUM PROGRAMMES

Prospective students who do not meet the minimum requirements to enrol for mainstream programmes, may be considered for placement in the Extended Curriculum Programme (ECP). Placement is subject to the availability of space.

The ECP is designed to equip students who do not meet the minimum requirements with the necessary competencies to be successful in their studies. Academic support and skills development are integrated with regular academic work. To be considered for placement in the ECP, prospective students have to apply for the mainstream programmes.

HIGHER CERTIFICATE IN THEOLOGY: HCert (Theology)

This one-year Higher Certificate in Theology offers an excellent introduction to the study of Christian ministry. It includes training in applicable skills designed to empower Christian leaders to make a meaningful impact in their faith communities. The course is designed for ministers, pastors, evangelists, members of church councils, Bible-study group leaders, Sunday-school teachers, youth leaders, chaplains, and anybody who wishes to learn more about the Christian ministry. The qualification also serves to provide students with the basic introductory knowledge, cognitive and conceptual tools, and practical techniques for further higher education studies in Theology.

Admission requirements

To be admitted to the Higher Certificate in Theology, a student must have a National Senior Certificate (from 2008) and an AP of at least 20, with a minimum performance Level 4 (50%) in English. **Note that admission to the Higher Certificate in Theology is subject to selection.**

Curriculum

The Higher Certificate in Theology requires 134 credits at NQF Level 5 and takes a minimum period of one academic year to complete. It consists of eight compulsory theology modules (128 credits), and one university module, TTCL1510 (6 credits).

The Higher Certificate in Theology is presented on a full-time (one academic year/two semesters) basis.

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY: BDiv

The four-year Bachelor of Divinity degree offers in-depth training to preachers, pastors, and church leaders for a professional career in Christian ministry. The degree is designed in consultation with churches and takes into account contemporary social issues such as justice, human dignity, violence, and ecology. The training is comprehensive, and students will be thoroughly grounded in disciplinary knowledge in Old and New Testament Studies, Historical and Constructive Theology, Church History, Church Polity, and Ethics. Students will also have the option to study the ancient languages, Greek and Hebrew. Practical ministry skills, such as pastoral care, youth work, preaching, leadership, and evangelism will also be acquired.

Students can also combine their studies in Theology with subjects from the Humanities (Psychology, Philosophy, Communication, Political Governance), Economic and Management Sciences (Management and Entrepreneurship), and Education to expand their career possibilities.

Admission requirements

To be admitted to the bachelor's programme, a student must be in possession of a National Senior Certificate (from 2008), an AP of 28, and a Level 4 (50%) in Afrikaans or English. **Note that admission to the Bachelor of Divinity is subject to selection.**

Students who do not meet these requirements may be admitted to the Extended Curriculum Programme with an AP of 24 and the certificate as mentioned above.

A degree in Theology qualifies you for various career possibilities:

- Minister, preacher, or pastor in a congregation
- Missionary or evangelist (locally or internationally)
- Chaplain in the SAPS, SANDF or Correctional Services
- Youth worker
- Journalist or broadcaster on religious topics
- Project leader in community development

- Researcher
- Lifestyle coach/ Lecturer in Theology

OLD TESTAMENT

The Old Testament is a library of books containing stories of people and their encounters with God; encounters that repeatedly gave meaning to their lives. When one embarks on a study of the Old Testament, one will find that its stories, poems, words of wisdom, heroic tales, and in some cases its narratives of misfortune – are gripping stuff. To gain an understanding of this part of the Bible, one will start on a journey of interesting and creative interplay between the world of the Old Testament and oneself as the present-day reader.

To get a grip on the richness of the Old Testament, one needs to study the texts of the Old Testament, exploring their fascinating literary and historical features. At the same time, one must also have insight into the main introductory questions and theological trends of the Old Testament; therefore, different theologies of and in the Old Testament are also studied.

The history of Israel, the cultural-historical background of the Old Testament, the geography of Israel, and the hermeneutics of the Old Testament help to open up the meaningful messages of the Old Testament.

NEW TESTAMENT

In the New Testament discipline, we attempt to thoroughly understand the 27 writings of the New Testament. We do this by placing each piece of writing within the original situation in which it was written. In this way, we do not only attempt to understand what the first author(s) tried to communicate to a particular group of Christians, but also what the Lord wants to communicate to modern believers. Therefore, we investigate issues such as, 'Who was/were the author(s) of a particular writing?'; 'When was it written?'; 'What background information is vital for understanding the writings of the New Testament?'; 'What methods can help us to understand the New Testament adequately?'; 'How did it happen that these 27 writings became part of the New Testament?'; and 'How can one formulate the message of the New Testament writings in the most adequate way?'

GREEK

In Greek, we empower students to unlock the richness of the Greek New Testament and other Early Christian literature against the background of the world in which they originated. During undergraduate studies, we introduce students to essential concepts and principles of Greek grammar, textual criticism, rhetoric (the 'art of persuasion'), and other aspects, enabling them to read, analyse, and interpret the texts efficiently while observing these principles. Being able to read and analyse texts from the New Testament in its original language, definitely enriches a student's experience of exegesis. We also introduce students to a selection of online resources and learning tools (including mobile apps). These tools provide support during the learning process and put the Greek texts and translations in the palm of their hands, with a variety of resources to analyse the texts at their fingertips. Students who wish to pursue postgraduate studies in Greek can register for our exciting new honours degree in New Testament Greek and other Early Christian literature.

HISTORICAL AND CONSTRUCTIVE THEOLOGY

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

This academic field of study entails a number of disciplines, e.g., Encyclopaedia, Symbolics, Systematic Theology, Ethics, and Apologetics.

Encyclopaedia attends to the development of Theology as a scientific discipline and to the contemporary challenges for the public university.

Symbolics focuses on the phenomenon of the creeds and confession of the church from the Early Church to the 20th Century.

Systematic Theology studies the content of the Christian faith in a coherent manner. Questions pertaining to the faith of the church, e.g., about God, salvation, and the church, are addressed. This is done from various perspectives, e.g., Biblical, Reformational, Contemporary, and African.

Human behaviour in terms of certain norms is the subject field of Ethics. Contemporary dilemmas in relation to social justice, sexuality, and digital communication are studied.

In the subject of Apologetics, challenges from modernism and postmodernism to the truth of the Christian faith are addressed, as well as how theology should respond to that.

CHURCH HISTORY AND POLITY

Ecclesiology mainly consists of two subjects: Church History and Church Polity.

Church History is subdivided into general (from 33 AD until the present) and South African church history, and includes the history of missions, the history of the relation between churches, and the development of the doctrine of the church. This history is studied with theological insight and a proper knowledge of the discipline of church history writing.

Church Polity is studying issues such as the offices in the church, meetings in the church, i.e., synods, church discipline, and the relationship between church and state and church and education. We focus on two sides of this coin: Biblical principles for the governance of the church, and how this was addressed throughout history.

PRACTICAL AND MISSIONAL THEOLOGY

PRACTICAL THEOLOGY

The Word of God for the people of today – this is the world that Practical Theology leads you into. The study field of Practical Theology covers four terrains of study:

- Homiletics and liturgy, where attention is given to preaching and the worship service.
- Pastoral care has to do with caring for people, from individual to family problems, to community challenges.
- Congregational studies and leadership investigate the environment and community where the faith community is called to make a difference; the question is asked – what happens in congregations.
- Faith formation looks at the facilitation of our faith, especially to young people within a new and challenging context.

MISSIONOLOGY

Being a missionary is to spread the glorious Good News of Jesus Christ into the world. With us, you will learn what the Bible has to say about missions; what people believe about God and the gods, and how a Christian should proclaim the Good News in a comprehensive manner. The needs of people are confronted, for example, poverty and HIV/Aids. A student will also learn how the gospel can be realised and expressed in the congregation to reach others. The inspiring story of how the gospel was spread throughout the ages is also told. The challenge to become personally involved in mission work is posed, and methods for reaching people in the best possible way are determined and explained.

Although the majority of people in South Africa are Christians, the country is regarded as a pluralistic and multi-religious society. In this sense, South Africa is the land of many religions. Religion Studies focuses on the sociological study of major religions and how they are practised in South Africa. Thus, in this subject, these major religions are studied thematically. The motivation for Theological students to study other religions is to equip them to better understand and meaningfully engage with other religions, either in discussions or for the purpose of missions. Religion Studies therefore opens up a world of religions to the Theological student.

In the Religion Education course, Religion Studies focuses on a basic introduction to different religions, as well as how to engage meaningfully with learners in both primary and high schools.

HEBREW

Biblical Hebrew is the language of the Old Testament and also provides both the background and the central religious concepts for the New Testament. Through an understanding of Hebrew within its cultural context in ancient Israel and the ancient Mediterranean world, it is possible to read and understand the message of the Bible – Old Testament, New Testament, and Apocrypha – in new and insightful ways. By reading the Old Testament in Hebrew, pastors, theologians, and Bible translators are empowered to understand the Old Testament first-hand. We have developed innovative teaching methods, which take into account the different linguistic and cultural backgrounds of our students, so that the language of the Old Testament and its most important theological concepts are accessible to everyone. Students are assisted in preparing the Hebrew passages that will be studied in Old Testament exegesis classes, resulting in a coherent learning experience in language, exegesis, and theology.
