GUIDELINES FOR THE SUBMISSION OF ABSTRACTS FOR PAPER AND *WORKSHOP PRESENTATIONS

Abstracts of 150-200 words for paper presentations, and 250-400 for workshop presentations, should be submitted by e-mail as an Ms Word file accompanied by the following information:

- Full title of the paper
- Title, full names and surname
- Institutional affiliation
- E-mail address (if paper has multiple authors, please state name of corresponding author)
- Telephone (cell/mobile or office): Fax Number: Postal address and postal code

Abstracts must be submitted in English

No references, tables or graphics should be included in the abstract

When using abbreviations within the body of the abstract, please spell out the name in full at first mention and follow with the abbreviation in parenthesis.

It is the responsibility of the author to ensure abstract text does not contain any typos or grammatical errors.

Paper presentations will be confined to 20 minutes plus a 10-minute question/discussion session.

Workshops will be 60 minutes in duration and should have a minimum of two authors. Only three workshops will be accepted.

No changes can be made after the abstract deadline has passed.

All abstracts will be adjudicated.

* A workshop is an opportunity for a group of interested delegates to be engaged in intensive discussion and activity on a topic and innovative research on any area relating to the Conference theme.

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

The 21st BIENNIAL INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE OF THE AFRICAN LANGUAGES ASSOCIATION OF SOUTHERN AFRICA will be held at the University of the Free State in Bloemfontein, South Africa. It will address a range of critically important themes in the various fields of linguistics, applied linguistics and sociolinguistics.

The Conference is held in the year declared by UNESCO as the International Year of Indigenous Languages, and therefore challenges the delegates to reflect on critical topical issues facing indigenous languages in the digital age.

Plenary sessions will include presentations by some of the world's leading thinkers in the humanities, as well as numerous paper and workshop presentations.

The purpose of the conference is to attract scholars and researchers from a variety of disciplines and to bring together a cohort of established and emerging researchers in one assembly to deliberate on topics related to the theme and sub-themes.
