Archiving South African Universities Programme: 18-19 March 2024

The Research Project on the Histories of Universities in South Africa (RPHUSA) aims to encourage and produce rigorously researched, critical institutional histories of universities, historical scholarship on the development of the overall university system and on aspects of universities from a historical perspective.

RPHUSA has established a network of scholars across South Africa and beyond who are undertaking work on various fronts. It is supported by several universities, the Mellon Foundation and the National Institute for Humanities and Social Sciences.

This second workshop of the RPHUSA will focus on institutional archives and historical methods in an effort to address several related questions:

- How, in what ways and to what extent does the development of South Africa's university system reflect and impact the economic, social and political priorities of the state during different historical periods?
- What role did universities play in the apartheid state's efforts to entrench segregation and develop its bantustans?
- How has the historical legacy of universities, both Historically Advantaged Universities (HAUs) and Historically Disadvantaged Universities (HDUs), shaped the landscape of post-1994 universities in South Africa?
- To what extent do institutions' archives enable us to narrate these histories?

The workshop brings together scholars who have written histories of universities or are working on such histories, and early career scholars, postdocs and PhD students who are linked in different ways to the Research Project on the Histories of Universities in South Africa (RPHUSA) with the following aims:

- 1. To share work in progress and developments to date related to the ongoing research of the RPHUSA.
- 2. To discuss sources, and institutional archives in particular, in regard to this work. Sharing experiences of navigating source material across disparate institutions promises to be a fruitful way to share ideas, methodologies, and best practices, as well as to consider the broader landscape of researching higher education in South Africa.

3. To brainstorm collaborative grant applications that members of the network might pursue, in order to support ongoing research into the history of universities and higher education in South Africa.
