



ABOUT THE UFS







The University of the Free State (UFS) has a proud history as one of the oldest institutions of higher education in South Africa. It opened its doors in Bloemfontein in 1904 as the Grey University College, with six students in the Humanities. Today it is a multi-campus institution, with two diverse campuses in Bloemfontein and one in Qwaqwa in the scenic Eastern Free State, accommodating more than 40 000 students in its seven faculties (Economic and Management Sciences, Education, Health Sciences, the Humanities, Law, Natural and Agricultural Sciences, Theology and Religion), with an increasing number of international students and associates, and an ever-widening scope of active involvement in and contribution to its surrounding communities.

For the past 119 years, the UFS has been delivering quality graduates who have made their mark in various sectors. What sets the institution apart is its holistic student support initiatives, enabling it to achieve some of the highest success rates in the country. Delivering students who are in high demand in the global job market remains a top priority. An established network of industry partners and close collaboration with the public and private sectors, as well as a continuous process of transformation and curriculum renewal, dovetail to produce highly employable graduates.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE UFS CREST OVER MORE THAN A CENTURY



1904

Up to 1935, the same coat of arms was used as the Grey College School.



1935

By 1935, with the name change to University College of the Orange Free State, the coat of arms fell into disuse, especially among students.



1947

In 1947, an agreement between management and students led to the new motto *Per Fidem ad Sapientiam* (Through faith to wisdom).



1950

In 1952, it was changed to *In Deo Sapientiae Lux* (In God is the light of wisdom). The traditional orange, white and blue, linking the UFS to the South African national colours, changed in the late 1990s.

The orange was replaced by cherry red.



2011

The academic brand - the historic University of the Free State crest that has been the symbol of the university since 1952, has evolved to embrace the aesthetic expectations of the stakeholders.

The shape of the traditional academic shield has been simplified and contemporised. Much of the symbolism of the crest remains intact, acknowledging the location of the UFS brand as one of the country's premier institutions of higher education, with a proud history of academic excellence and an

ever-evolving, vibrant culture.

GUEST SPEAKER

DR JEREMIAH MOFOKENG MAKHETHA



r Jeremiah Mofokeng Makhetha was born in 1956 in Moema Street, Orlando West, Soweto. This is the street where Hector Petersen was killed on 16 June 1976. His home is between the Sisulu and Mandela homes in Orlando West. His home was teargassed on 17 June, as the street became a hive of student unrest. He went to Orlando West High School - the school where all the drama took place. Ironically, he was writing an Afrikaans exam on 16 June when the students from Morris Isaacson stormed the school.

His interest in the arts was sparked by attending the performances of Gibson Kente's musical at Uncle Tom's Hall -

opposite the Hector Petersen memorial. He then participated in the Community Theatre initiatives at Youth Alive in Dube, Soweto. He started as an actor and ended up as the writer and director of the group.

In 1983, he went to Wits University's School of Dramatic Arts. He initially majored in Acting but graduated with Directing as his second major. In 1986, he auditioned for Peter Brook's Mahabharata and got cast in the production. He, however, chose to take on the Fulbright Scholarship to Columbia University in New York, where he obtained his MFA in Theatre Directing and Management.

After graduating from Columbia University, he went to lecture at his alma mater – Wits University. He was simultaneously appointed as Resident Director at the Market Theatre. Since leaving Wits, he has been at the helm of the artistic life of theatres:

- Deputy Artistic Director at the Johannesburg Theatre.
- Artistic Director at the State Theatre.
- Artistic Director at the Performing Arts Centre of the Free State.

His theatrical acting and directing credits are too numerous to list. He is perhaps best known for his special hand in interpreting classical works such as Brecht's Mother Courage and the recent production of Fugard, Kani, and Ntshona – The Island.

In 2019, the University of the Free State recognised the depth and breadth of his contribution to the arts and awarded him an honorary Doctor of Letters degree.

Dr Mofokeng wa Makhetha is best known for his work on the film and TV screens. His primary accolades for acting are:

- SAFTA Lifetime Achievement Award 2013.
- The African Film Festival's (TAFF) African Film Legend Award 2018.
- King Moshoeshoe Film Festival.

BVIRINDI, Tawanda Ray

Tawanda Ray Bvirindi was born on 27 November 1989 in Nyazura, Makoni District in the Manicaland Province in Zimbabwe. He matriculated at Mavhudzi High School in Nyazura in 2008. In 2012, Tawanda obtained a Bachelor of Science Honours Degree in Sociology from the University of Zimbabwe with merit. He graduated with a Master of Science Degree in Sociology and Social Anthropology at the University of Zimbabwe in 2015, also with merit.

With his thesis, titled: WHITENESS AND DESTITUTION: DECONSTRUCTING WHITENESS AND WHITE PRIVILEGE IN POSTCOLONIAL ZIMBABWE, the candidate contributes to scholarship on the complex dynamics of racialised identities in relation to privilege and destitution. The study was guided by a postcolonial intersectional whiteness lens combining concepts from postcolonial theory and whiteness studies with intersectionality and the Foucauldian notion of heterotopia. This study is significant for its in-depth literature illustrating how colonial racialised discourses of othering shape contemporary discourses on race. The conceptually rich theoretical framework facilitated an insightful analysis of the empirical data and allowed for the study of the notion of 'whiteness' beyond the current theoretical boundaries of whiteness studies. The major contribution of this research can be described as the exploration of white social identity through the theory of intersectionality revealing that 'whiteness' functions as a complicated continuum of privilege and dependency rather than a fixed and homogenous class.

NTLHABO, Makashane Archibald

Makashane Ntlhabo was born on 24 September 1974 in Maseru, Lesotho. He matriculated at Bereng High School, Mafeteng district, in 1992. He received a Swedish scholarship in 2000 to pursue a postgraduate diploma in Museum and Heritage Studies through a joint programme of the University of Cape Town, University of the Western Cape and the Robben Island





Training Programme. He later obtained a postgraduate diploma in Art, Culture and Heritage and a Master of Arts in Heritage from the University of the Witwatersrand. Makashane started his career as a freelance journalist while working as a tourist guide at the Basotho Cultural Village in Qwaqwa, where he would become heritage officer (2001) and later manager (2004). In 2014, he joined the Department of Sport, Arts, Culture and Recreation in Bloemfontein as heritage researcher where he currently is the manager of liberation heritage sites.

With his thesis, titled: NAVIGATING BETWEEN THE SACRED AND THE PROFANE: MOHOKARE SACRED SITES, SPIRITUAL TOURISM AND THE CHALLENGES IN THE FORMAL HERITAGE SECTOR, the candidate explores the complex challenges of managing sacred sites in the Mohokare Valley within the formal South African heritage sector through the novel Afrikana-Decolonial Theoretical Framework and Afrikana-Participatory Action Research. He argues convincingly that current heritage management practices are not adequate for managing and ensuring access to these sites and he unpacks the incongruity between heritage tourism and spiritual tourism/pilgrimage. With this contribution, Ntlhabo offers empirical solutions to mitigate the sacred/profane tensions created by the inheritance of a colonial approach to heritage administration that superseded Afrocentric customs, values, and experiences. The research culminated in the Integrated Management Plan offering concrete management policy suggestions to enhance site accessibility, visitation, and preservation, a contribution described by one examiner, 'as one of the strongest areas of the thesis and arguably it's biggest value'.

TAGARIROFA, Jacob

Jacob Tagarirofa was born on 6 November 1983 in Bikita district of Masvingo Province, Zimbabwe. He matriculated at Pamushana High School in 2002 and later attained a BSc Social Anthropology degree at Great Zimbabwe University in 2008 and a Master of Arts in Development Studies at the University of the Western Cape in 2012. His career in academia began at Great Zimbabwe University as teaching assistant in 2008 after graduating as the best student in the Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology. He became a full-time lecturer in 2013 at the same institution after completing his master's degree.

With his thesis, titled: POSTHUMAN SECURITY AND LANDMINES: GENDERED MEANING-MAKING AND MATERIALITIES IN THE NORTH-EASTERN BORDER AREA OF ZIMBABWE, the candidate contributes to the literature on security by using an Africancentred analysis that not only challenges existing security theorisation but posits a new gender sensitive posthuman (materialist) approach to the study of human (everyday) security. Through an ethnographic study of the gender dynamics in Mukumbura (Zimbabwe), a post-conflict border area still littered with landmines, Tagarirofa provides a thick description of the lived experiences of that community and how they negotiate living with the threat of landmines. The study challenges the binaries between meaning/security discourse and objects/landmines through empirical findings that highlight the gendered meanings the community attaches to the landmines and how landmines reconfigure gender relations. Gender role reversal and spiritual elements contribute to a redefined and more comprehensive understanding of victimhood and agency in this context.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN PSYCHOLOGY

DU PLOOY, Caryn

Caryn du Plooy was born in Springs on 21 February 1992. She received her secondary education in Amanzimtoti, matriculating at Kuswag High School in 2010. She obtained a bachelor's degree majoring in psychology and sociology in 2014 at North-West University, with an Honours degree in Psychology in 2015 and a Master of Arts degree in Clinical Psychology in 2017.





Her career as a clinical psychologist started in Potchefstroom in 2018. She moved to New Zealand in 2020 and is currently appointed as a clinical psychologist by the New Zealand Department of Corrections, assessing and treating individuals with various criminogenic needs.

With her thesis, titled: THE DEVELOPMENT OF GUIDELINES TO CULTIVATE THE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING OF CAREGIVERS WORKING WITHIN SOUTH AFRICAN CHILDREN'S HOMES, the candidate contributed to Positive Psychology and Psychological Well-being (PWB). The purpose of this study was two-fold: 1) to obtain an in-depth understanding of the lived experiences of caregivers working in South African children's homes from a PWB perspective and based on these results, 2) to develop guidelines aimed at enhancing their PWB. This study involved ten caregivers and eight key informants and was the first to explore the lived experiences of caregivers working within a South African children's home from a strength-based paradigm. Using a qualitative approach, this study developed a set of practical guidelines for South African caregivers. These serve as a free resource to cultivate their PWB and empower themselves by building on their positive psychological resources as they navigate the challenges facing them in these roles.

HEPPELL, Marlize

Marlize Heppell was born in Pretoria on 18 July 1962. She matriculated at Potchefstroom Gimnasium in 1980. She obtained the degree Baccalaureus Artium in Communication Studies (cum laude) in 1984, an Honours degree in Political Sciences in 1985, an Honours degree in Psychology in 2003 (cum laude) and her Magister degree in Clinical Psychology in 2005. In 2001 she received a reward as one of the top three students in the Faculty of Health Sciences from the NWU. She is a registered clinical psychologist and the HOD of the Psychology Department at the Klerksdorp/Tshepong Hospital Complex.

With her thesis, titled: THE EXPERIENCES OF ADOLESCENT DAUGHTERS OF MOTHERS DIAGNOSED WITH BORDERLINE PERSONALITY DISORDER, the candidate contributed to the gap in South African research on Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD). With this contribution, she undertook a qualitative exploration of the selected topic by applying an interpretive phenomenological analysis. Participants' experiences were related and integrated within attachment theory, using an additional transgenerational lens. The study explored the experiences of the impairment, intrinsically part of a BPD diagnosis, on adolescent daughters. Findings generated knowledge to inform psychologists on treatment options and programme planning, as psychotherapeutic involvement is regarded as one of the protective factors to prevent the creation of a dysfunctional transgenerational pattern. The study also addressed the need in the literature about the therapeutic and emotional needs of adolescent daughters with mothers with a BPD diagnoses.

SHIRIMA, Catherine Mkaleso

Catherine Mkaleso Shirima was born in Rombo Kilimanjaro, Tanzania, on 19 April 1983. She received her secondary education in Kakamega, Kenya, where she matriculated at the Sacred Heart Mukumu Girls High School in 2002. She obtained her bachelor's degree in Psychology and Education summa cum laude from St. Augustin University in Kinshasa in the DRC (2015). In 2016, she obtained an Honou rs degree in Psychology, and in 2019, a Master's degree in Clinical Psychology with distinction, both from the University of the Free State. She is currently lecturing at St. Joseph's Theological Institute in Cedara (KZN).

With this thesis titled: LONGITUDINAL TRAJECTORIES OF IDENTITY FORMATION AND RESILIENCE DEVELOPMENT IN ADOLESCENTS LIVING IN DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, the candidate employed an equal-weight, concurrent mixed-methods research approach with a longitudinal design to investigate the trajectories of and associations between the dimensions of identity and resilience. Data was collected over three time periods (in intervals of six months) from approximately 600 surveys and 18 focus group interviews. Analyses of variance and a hybrid approach of inductive and deductive reflexive





thematic analyses revealed novel insight into the interactions between identity and resilience, specifically related to the identity dimension of Exploration in Depth and resilience. Findings portrayed the complexity of finding a balance between risks and opportunities and adolescents' agency when faced with adversity. A strong sense of self, acceptance from significant others, religious beliefs, and supportive societal structures were emphasised as important resources when dealing with hardship while transitioning into adulthood.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY WITH SPECIALISATION IN AFRICA STUDIES

SELEKA, Livingstone Malatsi

Malatsi Seleka was born in Brakenberg, South Africa on 23 January 1986. He grew up in Gaborone, Botswana. He completed high school in 2004 at Naledi Secondary School. He read for a BA Humanities (Archaeology & English) (2009) and an MA in Development Studies (2015) at the University of Botswana. Malatsi commenced his doctoral studies at the University of Free State in 2017. He has held several academic and administrative positions at the University of Botswana. He worked at the Institute of Development Management before joining Stepping Stones International in 2022. Malatsi has research and consultancy experience in archaeology.

In his thesis, titled: PEOPLE, NATURE AND RESOURCES: MANAGING LAND-USE CONFLICTS IN NGAMILAND, BOTSWANA, the candidate has contributed to the study of land use in Ngamiland, Botswana. Focusing on Mababe village, the study highlighted how the nexus of people, land use and natural resources needs to be carefully balanced. The candidate used several theoretical and methodological approaches to investigate how the implementation of policies and development programmes can affect vulnerable communities. The study critiqued the use of the Community-Based Natural Resources Programme (CBNRMP) as an initiative to enhance community participation in local development. It highlighted shortcomings in how government agencies manage resources in Protected Areas including missed opportunities to be more inclusive in engaging communities. The buildup of conflict could be avoided using peacebuilding and community focused approaches including participatory and multi-stakeholder processes. The study concludes by noting the need for continuous review of development programmes.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY WITH SPECIALISATION IN DRAMA AND THEATRE ARTS

SMIT, Annebelle

Annebelle Smit was born on 18 May 1989 in Bloemfontein. She matriculated at Jim Fouché High School in 2007. She graduated with a BA degree in Drama at the University of the Free State in 2010. In 2012 she obtained a Masters degree and in 2023, the PhD in Drama and Theatre Arts, both at the University of the Free State. Her career as a lecturer in the Department of Drama at the University of the Free State began in 2013. At present she steers the divisions of Theatre for the youth and South African Theatre, as fields of expertise.

With her thesis, titled: IDEOLOGIE IN DIE AFRIKAANSE DRAMA: VERTEENWOORDIGENDE DRAMAS VANAF 1948 TOT 1994, the candidate contributes to scholarship on literary discourse, focusing on how Afrikaans drama became part of the literary basis for the discourse on socio-political and ideological conceptualisations in South African society, since the late





1940s. The study examines how literary texts correlate with a socio-political and historical narrative in a particular society within a particular historical period. Although drama may encapsulate the ideological viewpoint of a specific decade, it constantly engages with previous and succeeding periods. As a reflective or preemptive voice, the drama text continuously provokes border-shifting contextualisations and interpretations. The study presents the argument that through the dramatization of reality, societal knowledge, perceptions and beliefs are more readily contextualised when ideologies are deconstructed on a collective level in an attempt to identify alternative approaches. Consequently, the drama text reflects representation not only for individual playwrights but for society at large.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY WITH SPECIALISATION IN PHILOSOPHY

HAY, Emma Suzanne

Emma Hay was born in London on 23rd August 1982. She completed her secondary education at Mintlaw Academy in Aberdeenshire, Scotland. In 2007, she obtained a BA in Applied Social Sciences with First Class Honours at the Robert Gordon University, Aberdeen. She later began her career as a lecturer in St Albans, England. Following relocation to South Africa in 2012, she has since worked for a decade lecturing undergraduate sociology. To be able to register for a PhD in philosophy she was granted RPL by the University of the Free State. At present, she works as a permaculture designer.

With her thesis, titled: ON LEARNING TO BE RESPONSE-ABLE: RE-CONCEPTUALISING THE HUMAN RELATIONSHIP WITH NATURE FROM AN INTERDISCIPLINARY, RADICAL ECOLOGICAL PERSPECTIVE, the candidate approaches environmental and economic challenges from an integrated, radical-ecological perspective. The author applies a rhizomatic methodology (borrowed from Deleuze & Guattari) to explore the concept of "response-ability" (the ability to respond), by synthesising multiple critical and ecological approaches, including ecotherapy; ecopsychology; ecological economics; deep ecology; ecofeminisms; and social ecology. The rhizomatic perspective adopted provides a heuristic framework for approaching ecological reality, which is shown to be characterised by uncertainty, unpredictability, and power constraints, yet also holds the potential for agency and "response-ability". In responding to the findings, the author advocates for an alternative ecological ontology that values interrelationality, heterogeneity, and co-implication. This involves recognising and valuing dynamic alterity, and embracing the unpredictability, uncertainty and the heartbreak that comes with it. Discussed are the implications of becoming "response-able" at both the academic and personal level.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY WITH SPECIALISATION IN SOCIAL WORK

KRÜGER, Cornelia Dorethea

Cornelia Kruger was born in Randfontein on 22 April 1968. She received her secondary education in Klerksdorp and matriculated at Wesvalia high school. She obtained her degree in 1991 at the Huguenot College in Wellington, her Masters's degree in 2013 (UFS) and her PhD in Social work at the University of the Free State in 2023. She started her social work career in Wolmaransstad in 1992. She moved to Bloemfontein as a social worker specialising in working with children. In 2011, the Department of Education appointed her as a school social worker. Cornelia relocated to New Zealand in December 2019.

With her thesis, titled: GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOL SOCIAL WORKERS IN THE HANDLING OF LEARNERS WITH BULLY BEHAVIOUR: A RESTORATIVE JUSTICE APPROACH, the candidate contributes to scholarship on school social work





by exploring the behaviour of learners with bully behaviour and how to deal with such learners. Using a mixed-methods design (QUAL/quan), Kruger interviewed 12 school social workers from four provinces in South Africa. The quantitative study consisted of 47 respondents from nine provinces. The study revealed that environmental factors such as school climate, the home, and the community contribute to bullying behaviour. It also revealed that school social workers rarely include the victims, families, and bystanders in interventions. Most of the school social workers were also excluded from the disciplinary process of learners with bullying behaviour. Working from a restorative justice philosophy, the candidate developed guidelines that will promote the prevention and management of bullying behaviour in schools.

She obtained the degree BA (Social work) in 1993 (Pu for CHE), the degree MA (Social work) with distinction in 2011 (UFS) and the PhD in Social work in 2023 at the University of the Free State. She started her career as social worker in Postmasburg in 1997. In 2003 she was appointed at Engo and at present she is the Director: Family Care and Disabled Care at Engo.

With her thesis, titled: **GUIDELINES FOR SOCIAL WORK SUPERVISION FROM A DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH**, the candidate contributes to scholarship on the supervision and management of social work by exploring the implementation of supervision from the developmental approach. Using a mixed-methods design (QUAL/quan), Nortje interviewed 21 social workers from five provinces in South Africa. The quantitative study consisted of 51 respondents from seven provinces. The study revealed that supervisors do not use the developmental approach during supervision. She also found that a lack of knowledge of the developmental approach and structural issues, such as a lack of resources and societal realities, hamper this approach's implementation. A haphazard approach to supervision will also negatively impact the development of social workers and lead to poor service delivery. The candidate developed guidelines that will promote the integration of the developmental approach in supervision.

DOCTOR OF PSYCHOLOGY IN CHILD PSYCHOLOGY

SMALL, Renée Frances

Renée Frances Small was born on 08 May 1982 in Queenstown, Eastern Cape, and matriculated at Queenstown Girls' High School in 2000. In 2005, she obtained a Bachelor of Psychology from Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University and a Postgraduate Certificate in Education from the University of South Africa in 2006. In 2011, she graduated with a Master of Arts in Clinical Psychology with distinction at NMMU. She ran a private practice in the Eastern Cape as a clinical psychologist from 2011-2017. Since 2018, she has worked in private practice as a clinical psychologist in Bloemfontein and at Eunice Primary School.

With her thesis, titled: AN ECOCULTURAL EXPLORATION OF PLAY IN YOUNG CHILDREN WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DELAYS LIVING IN RESOURCE-LIMITED CONTEXTS: A CAREGIVER PERSPECTIVE, the candidate contributed to the field of child development, particularly within the South African context. The study focused on the ecocultural perspective of play in Basotho children with developmental disabilities. Using a qualitative exploratory and descriptive approach, twelve caregivers participated in focus groups, exploring the toys and play materials their children use, how and where they play, and the functions play has for their children. The findings revealed useful information about how young children with developmental disabilities play in culturally diverse and resource-limited settings in South Africa, providing insights into cultural adaptations needed for naturalistic, play-based early interventions.

DOCTOR OF PSYCHOLOGY WITH SPECIALISATION IN CHILD PSYCHOLOGY

CHANNON, Dane Paul

Dane Channon was born on 27 March 1985 in East London, South Africa. He matriculated at Port Rex THS and began his tertiary studies in 2005 at the University of Fort Hare. He holds a B.Soc.Sci. degree, an Honours degree in Psychology and a M.Soc.Sci. degree (Counselling Psychology). He has been working as a counselling psychologist in private practice since 2011 and is currently a senior psychologist in a practice in East London. He has served as a time-on-task lecturer for post graduate students and supervises psychologist interns. In 2019 he was dual registered as a chartered psychologist in the United Kingdom.

With his thesis, titled: **ACADEMIC RESILIENCE OF CHILDREN WHO OVERCOME ADVERSITY**, the candidate employed a qualitative, multiple case study method to explore how children navigate, negotiate, and engage with their social ecologies to overcome adversity and demonstrate academic resilience. The social ecology of resilience framework (SERT) was used to conceptualise the study. Multiple data collection sources were used and triangulated, which contributed to the descriptive and explanatory analyses of the data. The case studies yielded rich and detailed information on the biological vulnerabilities, challenging social and physical environments, specific negative life events and compound socio-demographic risks experienced by these children. It also yielded rich information on the personal, relational, structural, and spiritual/cultural resilience enablers in the children's ecologies, and the processes by which they identified and used these enablers across their social ecologies to evince not only academic but also personal resilience.

THE SEANAMARENA THE TRADITIONAL BASOTHO BLANKET



The Main Procession Graduation Gowns - embroidered with rich diversity

South Africa, and the Free State in particular, has a long-standing friendship with our neighbouring country, Lesotho.

Through a shared history, we have become co-creators of our futures. For this reason, the UFS decided to incorporate our tradition with that of the Basotho in the design of our Main Procession graduation gowns.

The gowns are inspired by the Seanamarena – the traditional Basotho blanket. The different patterns on the Seanamarena indicate the status one holds in the Basotho nation or reflect the occasion being celebrated. Keeping the Seanamarena pattern in mind, we combined our traditional academic designs with that of the Basotho nation.

YOKE PATTERNS



Yoke pattern for the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor

This Seanamarena pattern is an interpretation of a design used exclusively for the king and chiefs -which means 'to swear by the king'. This blanket has the highest status of all Basotho blankets.



Yoke pattern for the Chairperson of the Council

This Seanamarena Victorian crest motif appeared after the visit of the Prince of Wales to Lesotho in 1925. which made a profound impression on the local people. Customers refer to this blanket as 'lesiba' meaning feathers - when buying it.



Yoke pattern for the Vice-Rector

This Seanamarena Poone design symbolises good crops, wealth, and fertility. The Poone is given as a present to honour an important visitor.



Yoke pattern for Registrar

The same Seanamarena Poone design used for the Vice-Rector applies to the Registrar, with some slight design and colour alterations.

The Deans wear gowns made in the colours of the faculties, or others which indicate the office they hold.
