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What is Gateway Orientation?

Two weeks prior to the start of classes, all first-years have the unique opportunity to enter the Gateway to succeed in their study careers and in university life. The annual Gateway Orientation for First-Year Students is a programme on student life. The programme is packed with a series of learning events that introduce students to campus and faculty life. It is designed to help every first-year student to adjust to the university environment, introduce students to the new environment; and to teach and transfer skills to achieve academic success and prepare students to be well-rounded graduates.

The Gateway Orientation experience includes a series of exciting lectures to guide your understanding and expectations of university life. Furthermore, it helps you to orientate yourself on campus and to all the resources available to support students. The experience includes exciting student-life activities, but also first-year sports events such as athletics and swimming as well as cultural events, among many other outcomes-based activities.

All of these events provide you with well-structured opportunities to meet new friends and establish friendship networks that will support you during your studies. During the orientation experience, you will also be introduced to a peer mentor in a student mentoring programme to further support you in adapting to university life.

Why is orientation important?

The Gateway Orientation programme introduces you to important services, programmes, and resources that will be of vital importance to becoming a successful student.

What is orientation?

The Gateway Orientation programme is a programme that facilitates a number of activities to new students during the two weeks directly before classes start for the first semester. These activities are purposefully designed to orientate new students effectively to the university environment and to assist them in this way with their higher education.

Is orientation compulsory?

Yes. It is packed with information that will be helpful for success at university.

Is orientation only for students living in university residences?

No. Orientation is for ALL first-year students.

All first-entry students at the University of the Free State.

Tips and advice

Find a Gateway Buddy whenever you feel lost!

Keep your UFS password safe and never share it with anyone.

Do not click 'Save my password' on any computer on campus.

Keep your student card safe; keep it with you all the time. Your student card is an identity card as well as a user's card. It provides access to the university campuses and the library, etc. You can also use the student card to make purchases (if loaded with money/cash). Should you lose your student card (lost, stolen or damaged), contact Office 0014, Intsika Building, Admin Ground Floor to replace it; a replacement fee is payable to replace a student card. Never lend your student card to anybody!

Keep your belongings safe! Never leave any of your belongings unattended.

Always bring a pen and notebook to class. Pay attention and be an engaged student. Ask if you are unsure or if you do not understand.

Prepare for class. Study daily.

Don't be late for classes.

Lead a healthy and balanced lifestyle. Eat. Drink water. Sleep. Study. Make friends.

New words and abbreviations (glossary)

You will hear new words, and we have simplified a few for you so that you don't struggle with your adjustment to university 'lingo'.

AP score	Admission point score allocated to your school subjects for admission to tertiary institutions.				
Applying for admission	The process by which a person's personal data is captured onto the uni- versity's database, but does not mean they have been accepted yet.				
Registration	A contractual agreement entered into annually by the university and an aspirant student, subject to procedures by virtue of which she or he is granted student status.				
Orientation	A period that gives first-entering students an opportunity to familiarise themselves with their university.				
Module	A self-contained unit of learning that forms part of the course.				
Compulsory module	A necessary module that a student has to do.				
Core module	Compulsory learning required in situations contextually relevant to a particular qualification.				
Elective module	A selection of additional credits from which a choice may be made to ensure that the purpose of the qualification is achieved.				
Fundamental or Core module	A module of which the learning forms the basis or foundation for the education required to obtain the qualification.				
Credit	The recognition obtained when a student passes examinations or test comply with conditions for completion of a qualification.				
Semester	A study period extending to half of the academic year.				
Academic year	A specified period given for the academic activities of a specific year, consisting of two semesters.				
Distinction	A final mark of 75% or more achieved in a module/course.				
Exemption	Students do not have to take examinations in a module, e.g. promoting a module.				
International student	A student who is not a South African citizen.				
Syllabus	The content of the module/course.				
Predicate	Total semester mark that determines whether or not a student can take an exam (as per faculty requirement).				
Prerequisites	The requirements for admission to a module, as stated in the general rules of the faculty.				
Plagiarism	When you use someone's words without acknowledging them.				
Graduation	The receiving or conferring of an academic degree or diploma.				
Academic	A teacher or scholar in a university or other institute of higher education.				
Professor	A university academic of the highest rank.				
Lecturer	A person that educates at an institution of higher learning.				
Dean	The head of a faculty.				
Vice-Chancellor	A person who is the principal of the university.				
Deputy Vice-Chancellor	Person who is second in charge under the Vice-Chancellor. You will hear people say 'DVC'.				
HOD	Head of Department.				
MBA	Master of Business Administration.				
RPL	Recognition of Prior Learning.				
Registrar	Responsible for student administration and institutional governance.
