ADMISSION

Pay attention to the following important information:

- Higher Education South Africa (HESA) sets specific admission requirements that you should meet if you want to study at any South African university. If you finished school in or after 2008, and have a National Senior Certificate (NSC), you need the following to apply for admission to a Bachelor's Degree at any South African university:
 - Four (4) of the seven (7) subjects included in your NSC subject package should be from the designated subject list.
 - A performance level of at least 4 (50%) in each of these four (4) subjects
- · All admission requirements apply to first-year students in 2018.
- · Admission to study at the UFS is dependent on the following:
 - Your application should meet all the minimum requirements for the programme
 - The programme must have available space and capacity to admit students
 - You have to submit valid school results with your application
- The UFS reserves the right to change the minimum requirements of each programme without notifying you.
- · Applications for all non-selection programmes close on 29 September 2017.

An admission point (AP) consisting of seven levels is used. Points will be awarded for six academic modules.

DESCRIPTION OF ACADEMIC PLANS FOR BA DEGREES

The Faculty of the Humanities makes provision for core academic plans in the BA degree. These plans are built around a specific core (majors), which, together with a relevant minor subject and an elective (s) offer a student a coherent curriculum with a purposeful outcome. During the registration and orientation week at the beginning of your first year, the programme directors will discuss the curriculum compositions with you and clear up any uncertainties. The following recommended academic plans are offered in the BA degree. Students should select one.

Academic plan 1: Majoring in Languages

A qualification in languages aims to provide you with the ability to communicate fluently and have a thorough understanding of the cultural context of the language being studied. In the case of the more ancient languages the focus is on the ability to interpret and translate in order to understand written text. Language studies emphasise the ability to convey messages that are grammatically sound, purposeful, and persuasive. A language qualification opens doors to the publishing world in its many forms; from being involved in the world of organised media to creative writing for a publication or for corporate communication.

Languages, of which you must choose two, include: Afrikaans and Dutch, English, French, German, Greek, Hebrew, Latin, Sesotho (mother tongue), South African Sign Language.

Academic Plan 2: Majoring in Classical Studies and Philosophy

A qualification of this nature aims to challenge you to use the insights provided by these subjects to think creatively and critically about your world. A primary outcome of this qualification would be to introduce you to the origins of ideas, meaning, and theories that drive a modern society. Issues driving modern society include logo therapy, feminism, stereotyping, and ethnic identity. Many of the most innovative and economically successful people in the world of today have qualifications in Philosophy.

Academic plan 3: Majoring in Liberal Arts and a language

A Liberal Arts qualification implies that a student has a multi-disciplinary view of the world and is able to integrate different perspectives. This academic plan opens the door to understanding the past and how the past has shaped and constructed the individuals and communities of the present day. A major in a language advances the understanding of how individuals and communities are given a voice in the complexity of the modern world. A qualification of this nature supports careers in general management and team building. **Liberal Arts, of which you must choose one, include:** Art History and Visual Culture Studies, Classical Studies, History, Philosophy

Languages, of which you must choose one, include: Afrikaans and Dutch, English, French, German, Hebrew

Academic plan 4: Majoring in Liberal Arts

Intrinsic to the study of this academic plan is the development of the skills a person needs to become a contributing member of society. Learning how to exercise informed analysis, judgement, and creative critique, grasp the role that language plays in supporting or changing the status quo and gives insight into how to build a future from a divided past. This qualification opens doors into heritage and tourism careers and careers in the many branches of the public services, as well as occupations such as art critics, journalists, and ethnographic researchers. A combination of History and a language in this academic plan would allow you to graduate into the teaching profession, as both of these are teaching subjects.

Liberal Arts, of which you must choose two, include: Anthropology, Art History and Visual Culture Studies, History, Philosophy, Classical Studies

Academic Plan 5: Majoring in Linguistics and a Language

Linguistics is the scientific study of how language evolved and how the structure of languages varies and therefore influences the way in which people interact and create understanding. The inclusion of language practice as minor opens doors to careers in translation and interpretation. Students who study this academic plan have opportunities to develop material for education and training in respect of different audiences, teaching languages, and assisting in the development of communication material for various industries. Students interested in this academic plan will also be interested in the BA (Language Practice) programme which specialises in translation and interpretation skills.

Languages, of which you must choose one, include: Afrikaans and Dutch, English, French, German, Hebrew, Sesotho (mother tongue), South African Sign Language

Academic Plan 6: Majoring in Geography and Social Science

Interested in the environment and the preservation of our ecological future, but can't get into a BSc? This is the academic plan for you. This programme specialises in Geography and Environmental Management but includes the necessary social science modules that create an understanding of the social issues implied in the management of the environment. To qualify for this academic plan you must have 50% for Mathematics. Mathematical Literacy is not sufficient, even if you get good marks.

Social Sciences, of which you must choose one, include: Anthropology, Political Science, Sociology, Communication Science

Academic Plan 7: Majoring in Communication Science and Psychology

A very popular choice, as the partnering of Communication Science and Psychology opens up a world of coaching and mentoring careers, as well as careers for communication specialists. This academic plan allows entry into the publishing world in its many forms, from being involved in the world of organised media to creative writing for publications or for corporate communication. This combination of subjects, with an appropriate postgraduate qualification, can also be a springboard for a career in Human Resource Management.

Academic Plan 8: Majoring in Political Science and Philosophy

Studying Politics provides an understanding of how power operates through the institutions of government; Philosophy offers insight into how we acquire knowledge and make moral decisions with the added value of instilling rigorous argumentation and critical thinking. The minor in Economics broadens learning to include an understanding of the role of economics in driving both political and moral decisions. Most graduates with this combination of subjects find themselves in banking and finances, politics, business management, management consultancy, and the many branches of public service. To qualify for this academic plan, you must have at least 50% for Mathematics. Mathematical Literacy will not be sufficient, even if you get good marks.

Academic Plan 9: Majoring in Psychology and a Language

This plan has been developed to accommodate students who wish to teach a language and would like to couple it with the teaching of the subject Life Orientation. The combination of subjects would also serve as a springboard into the world of publishing and editing and would also provide a basis for careers in general management, team building, coaching and mentoring.

Languages, of which you must choose one, include: Afrikaans and Dutch, English, French, German, Sesotho (mother tongue), South African Sign Language

In addition to the three-year BA programme, the university also offers a four-year BA Extended Curriculum Programme to accommodate prospective students with matriculation exemption, but with a minimum AP of 25.

Subject choices are the same as for BA programme, however, the following foundation provision modules are compulsory: Lifelong Learning, Mathematical Literacy, and an Academic Language module in English (first and second year)

If you fail to pass these development modules, you will NOT be allowed to move on to second-year modules.

A language practitioner is a professionally qualified person with an aptitude for languages, one who could solve other people's language issues in innovative ways.

A language practitioner works at the language offices of large industries and institutions, at government departments, public liaison companies, and advertising and promotion enterprises. He/she assists the developers of computer software and could be a very useful team member at information management agencies, NGOs, language agencies, or otherwise as an entrepreneur!

A language practitioner can specialise in one or more of the following fields:

Translator	Language technologist
Interpreter	Language engineer
Dictionary maker	Language programmer
Language manager	Copywriter and editor
Terminologist	Language facilitator

A language practitioner who wants to work in South Africa must be proficient in at least two of the official languages, one of which should be his/her home language and the other one English. Computer literacy is a prerequisite. Become a language practitioner and make languages work for you!

Are you interested in understanding the political environment; comprehending the changes in the political world around you; evaluating the process of political transformation; learning how to manage the political environment in the process of rapid change; and participating in the development of a new value system linked to good governance and democracy? This programme offers a unique multidisciplinary combination of learning outcomes, providing you with the necessary theoretical and practical skills to make a meaningful contribution in both the public and the private sectors of South African life.

It aims to:

- equip you with an understanding of the political, social, and economic realities of South Africa, as well as the necessary skills to contribute to the process of governance in a changing society;

DESCRIPTION OF BSocSci PROGRAMMES

Bachelor of Social Sciences (BSocSci)

The social sciences are academic fields that study society from a scientific point of view. Like other sciences, the social sciences ask questions about observable events; obtain and interpret evidence; and consider how it relates to a specific problem or how it relates to other events or trends at other times and places.

What can you do with a social science degree? You can enter a BSocSci degree with a specific career in mind. For example, studying Psychology to become a Psychologist or studying Political Science to work with a political party or government agency. This is good. Studies in the mentioned disciplines could be good preparation for pursuing these professional goals.

If you enjoy working with people, but do not have a clear idea of what you want to do, the BSocSci programme is a great option to consider. You could use the gained skills, no matter what you end up doing. For example, you learn to collect information; ask a good question about a body of information; develop an interpretation; and communicate an argument verbally or in writing.

These are core skills that are more valuable to most employers than the specific facts learnt in any given module. This is why, at many of the best universities in the world, all undergraduates are expected to take courses in Social Sciences and the Humanities, and most students major in one of these fields.

At the UFS we offer the following Social Science combination of majors:

- Academic plan 1: Criminology and Psychology
- Academic plan 2: Anthropology and Psychology/Sociology
- Academic plan 3: Psychology and Sociology
- Academic plan 4: Political Science and Anthropology/Criminology/Sociology
- Academic plan 5: Criminology and Sociology
- Academic plan 6: Social Sciences and Management Studies

Psychology is the study of the individual. How a person develops, when this development is not ideal, and how this can result in certain mental disorders. To work in this field, you must love helping people.

Sociology is the study of society. How does a society evolve, how does society manage itself? You will study social issues such as the family, industry, consumerism, and population development. Social theory provides sociology frameworks to help explain why society operates the way it does and how we can go about solving the problems of today.

Criminology is the study of the impact of crime on society. What can be done to prevent it and how should we work with the victims of crime and the criminals in order to reduce crime.

Anthropology is the study of culture and how societies develop and change their cultures. Anthropology works well with Sociology to help us understand how to tackle the problems we see around us every day.

Political Science is the study of politics and political institutions such as government, political parties, and non-governmental organisations. You study how these interact with each other to create the political climate of the present day. This understanding is then applied to issues such as international relations and power relations.

BSocSci FOUR-YEAR EXTENDED CURRICULUM PROGRAMME

In addition to the BSocSci degree, the university also offers a BSocSci four-year Extended Curriculum Programme to accommodate prospective students with matriculation exemption, but with an AP of between 25 and 29. The first academic year of the standard BSocSci degree is extended to two years of study. The curriculum is similar to the standard BSocSci curriculum above, and follows the same structure as the BA Extended Curriculum Programme as previously shown.
