Renaming of residence corridors

During their first month in office, the residence committee of 2015/2016 took the bold step of finally renaming the corridors of the residence. The corridors were renamed after the five values of the residence in languages from around the world, as follows:

Heelonder has become 'SiReSu' which is a combination of three of the values: Sisterly love, Respect and Support

Noord-Onder has become 'Irmandade' which is the Portugese for Sisterhood

Suid-Onder has become 'Fierte' which is French for Pride

Noord-Bo has become 'Mendukung' which is the Indonesian word for Support

Suid-Bo was renamed to 'Vinaya' which means Discipline in Arabic

The renaming has led to an improvement in the residence community and formed a more competitive atmosphere among the respective corridors.
