These awards celebrate students whose achievements embody the pillars of Vision 130. By recognising individuals who excel in academics, leadership and community service, the awards amplify the university's dedication to shaping graduates who are not only globally competitive but also deeply rooted in addressing regional and national challenges.

Purpose and origin

The EDSA Prestige Awards were established in 2022 to celebrate and honour students whose contributions align with the strategic goals of the University of the Free State (UFS) as well as the Division of Student Affairs (DSA).

The Executive Director: Student Affairs (EDSA) Prestige Awards aim to recognise students who contribute to the university's mission and objectives, as well as those of the Department of Student Affairs – through innovation, community service excellence, and/or sustained exceptional performance in an area or areas beneficial to UFS and its strategic objectives.

These awards are institutional, encompassing all three campuses (Bloemfontein, Qwaqwa and South Campus).

Student of the Year

The Student of the Year Award was added in 2023. This award is presented to a student who has exhibited a strong commitment to UFS in multiple areas of campus life. They are recognised for their academic excellence, leadership, contributions to their community, and exceptional achievements during their time at UFS.



TOP THREE

2023: EDSA Student of the Year

The panel underwent a rigorous process of adjudication to select one student who reflects the vision and objectives of the institution. The panel considered levels of engagement in leadership, community service, education and ‘star’ qualities among the applicants. Below are the top three winners.

1. Tlotlisang David Mhlambiso (Winner)

Tlotlisang is an embodiment of Vision 130, elevating the values of innovation, impact and excellence. He is a celebrated young author who has co-authored books that are aired on Lesedi FM and are archived in museums. The UFS has played a critical role in developing him as a writer through the UFS iCAN (Initiative for Creative African Narratives). The student’s focus area is promoting and preserving African language use in academic spaces, bridging the language gap (social justice) – a goal that he is achieving.

2. Thembile Mngomezulu (1st runner-up)

Thembile is engaged in a number of co-curricular activities and programmes and has demonstrated leadership achievements. Her co-curricular activities include community engagement in Qwaqwa (inclusive of high schools, through a ProMaths association she leads that teaches high school learners maths). Thembile has maintained a good academic average, and the panel found her to be a good all-rounder.

3. Lerato Mamobolo (2nd runner-up)

Lerato’s strength is her service to the local community of Qwaqwa, where she had vast experience in community engagement. Although she did not lead any initiatives, she participated in various organised team projects.

2024: EDSA Student of the Year

1. Siphilangenkosi Dlamini (Winner)

Siphilangenkosi clearly demonstrated and embodied the DSA strategies and Vision 130 goals, meeting all the criteria as an active and engaged student. His significant contributions to UFS enhanced student success and well-being, aligning with the university’s strategic objectives. Through his leadership in the Initiative for Creative African Narratives (iCAN) and the United Nations Association of South Africa (UNASA), UFS Chapter, Siphilangenkosi has fostered an inclusive environment that supports both academic achievement and personal growth.

2. Lebohang Mateka (1st runner-up)

Lebohang embodies strong leadership and mentorship and is involved in various university activities. As a dedicated peer mentor and class representative, she demonstrates a commitment to supporting fellow students. Her active participation in the Centre for Academic Advising Learning Community (CAALC), and leadership roles in organisations such as the Diamond League, Kovsie Pulse (as social media manager) and KovsieAct (as an executive member) showcase her diverse skill set and dedication to holistic development. Her contributions in media, marketing and student engagement made her a standout candidate.

3. Mookgo Khumalo (2nd runner-up)

Mookgo demonstrated strong leadership as President of the Golden Key and Treasurer of the Faculty Student Council, contributing to academic success and student well-being. Her roles as a tutor and teaching assistant reflect a commitment to mentoring students, aligning with the university’s mission of nurturing responsible, high-achieving students.

2023: EDSA Student of the Year

As a person who is passionate about writing and language education, through the support of the university (Academy for Multilingualism and African Languages Press), I am hoping that I will be able to visit more schools, not only in the Free State but also in other provinces that I happen to be situated in, because the aim is not only to impact locally, but also nationally and internationally. I hope to initiate talks about the importance of mother tongue, bilingualism, multilingualism, translanguaging and literacy and donate books whenever they are available. Meanwhile, I am also planning to write more books in indigenous languages, such as a recent publication of the fourth book, *IsiXhosa poetry book* by the National Library of South Africa (NLSA) and a recent reference of the second book:
