Spend some time reading Tshilidzi Marwala's *Closing the Gap: The Fourth Industrial Revolution in Africa.*

You do not have to read the whole book in one go. You can select certain chapters that interest you. You can read it over a period of two to three years. It is also a very good reference source. Spend a bit of time outside the boundaries of your chosen qualification, outside your prescribed curriculum. Sharpen your intellect. Explore, explore, explore. We strongly encourage this.

I am proud to say that the campus has a fantastic academic and student residential infrastructure and facilities. You will be very happy to know that the campus has Wi-Fi and computer labs, and a 24/7 quiet study centre. Make sure you have a device, whether it is a laptop or a tablet. The device is a very important and indispensable tool in your personal learning infrastructure. Look well after your device, as they don't come cheap.

We also have very strong and able student support services, such as a clinic with well-qualified staff, psychological and counselling services, finance and financial aid services, student housing and residence services, universal access and disability services, sports and culture services, protection services. - check their ufs4life emails on a regular basis;
- ensure that your contact number is correct and updated on the UFS system;
- · adhere to closing dates; and
- read through the frequently asked questions on the UFS website (<u>www.ufs.ac.za</u>).



STEP EIGHT

You will receive your monthly allowances in your bank account during the first week of each month for a period of 10 months (Feb–Nov) if you are registered for the full year.

9 STEP NINE

After the registration period has ended, your registration information will be submitted to NSFAS. Thereafter, submission of registration information for newly funded students will be submitted to NSFAS on a monthly basis. Once NSFAS has confirmed that the information has been processed, the payment will be made to your student class-fee account.

STEP ELEVEN

Your bursary amount will be finalised towards the end of the year, after which a final amount will be paid into your class-fee account.

10 STEP TEN

Students who have paid their own registration fee will have the opportunity to submit a refund request. Communication regarding the refund process will be sent to the students' ufs4life email address.



What is an academic adviser?

An academic adviser is a person who knows how to navigate the university and provides you with the advice and assistance you need to be successful in your studies. An academic adviser is someone who makes a student feel that someone is looking out for him/her. Advisers can connect you with the relevant support services, so that you get the most out of your studies.

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When do I need to get academic advice?

You will need to contact your academic adviser throughout your student journey – an academic adviser supports you towards success.





Recruitment

The UFS representatives you engaged with during Open Day last year via Kovsie2B Schools Recruitment events, were your first encounter with academic advising. Student recruiters help ensure that you apply for the degree that best aligns with your subjects and aspirations.

• Entry, admission

Student Academic Services (SAS), in collaboration with the faculty, facilitates your admission to the UFS. Faculty advisers then have conversations with you to help you register for the correct modules and plan your educational path. It is very important to meet with an academic adviser during registration, because this is where you get to learn more about the degree and understand the majors and minors aligned to your career aspirations.



Transition

After you have registered at the UFS, your faculty advisers and Central advisers (CTL) will support you in your journey. If you are struggling with time management, planning, and revisions skills, the Central Advising team is ready to help. While your faculty adviser keeps an eye on your modules, your CTL adviser will assist in providing academic support. You will also encounter peer advisers in your tutorial classes, residence space, and mentorship programme.

Success and progression

Rules and regulations play an integral role in educational planning. Your faculty and Central advisers are always available to help familiarise you with faculty rules, and to make sure that you keep within faculty regulations for progression. Our aim is to see you graduate in record time with a smile on your face!

Completion and graduation

The UFS Careers Office assists students in getting ready for the world of work. As you move closer to graduation, you need to meet with a different kind of adviser to help you with CV writing, interview skills and job interview workshops. Make sure you research the career you are aspiring to move into. Your CTL adviser can also provide you with advice on how to plan for postgraduate studies.

Housing and Residence Affairs

Residences play an important role in campus life, particularly at the UFS where the individual residences have a long, respected tradition. The main purpose of Housing and Residence Affairs (HRA) is to offer a variety of accommodation to students on campus, as well as to UFS visitors. In addition, we have established an office within HRA to assist with off-campus accommodation and the accreditation thereof, thus ensuring a safe and conducive environment for students in accredited off-campus accommodation.

The following is the basic information you need to know about HRA:

• To be accepted into a residence, the student must have an APS score of 30 points upwards.	 In total, we have 22 full- time residences and 6 day residences for students staying off campus. 	• Must be able to participate and comply with the rules of the residences.
• A student does not choose a residence, the system automatically picks one for them.	 Staying in residence means that you should pass very well, as there is a placement policy each year. 	The basic things you will find in a residence are a bed, table, chair, bathrooms and toilets, washing machines, and kitchens.

Placement Policy

It simply entails that students must renew their intent to stay in the residence every year if they so wish. This policy is based on three criteria, namely academics, age, and finance. So, to continue staying in the residence, you must pass all your modules to qualify.

Junior Residences

ConLaurês

Each residence constantly strives to maintain a sound balance between academic work and fun and games. An amount is divided annually among the residences that perform the best with regard to academics, sport, culture, and diversity.

A residence head is in charge of each residence (including city residences). The residence head is assisted by a prime and a residence committee (RC), which are separately and jointly responsible for the orderly and civilised management of the residence. They also ensure that residence rules are complied with and accept responsibility for everything that occurs in the residence.

Furthermore, the residence head fulfills the role of a substitute parent, serves as contact person for the parent, and looks after the interests and education of each individual first-year student in his/her residence.

About off-campus accommodation

The university realised that everyone cannot fit into the residences, and therefore saw the need to ensure that accredited off-campus accommodation should also be in good condition. So, the HRA manages the office for accredited off-campus accommodation

The safety and living conditions of our students are of great importance. Student accommodation is a significant aspect of the success of the UFS; consequently, good-guality accommodation is important for each individual student to be successful in their studies. The accreditation process entails a list of primary requirements, drafted with the cognisance of the Mangaung Metropolitan Municipality, in terms of off-campus accommodation to which private providers must adhere in order to be accredited by the university. The requirements are in line with the Policy on the Minimum Norms and Standards for Student Housing at Public Universities.

Campus lingo

New words and abbreviations (glossary)

You will hear new words, and we have simplified a few for you so that you don't struggle in your adjustment to university 'lingo'.

AP score Admission point score allocated to your school subjects for admission to tertiary institutions.

Applying for admission The process by which a person's personal data is captured onto the university's database, but does not mean they have been accepted yet.

Registration A contractual agreement entered into annually by the university and an aspirant student, subject to procedures by virtue of which she or he is granted student status.

Orientation A period that gives first-entering students an opportunity to familiarise themselves with their university

Module A self-contained unit of learning that forms part of the course.

Compulsory module A necessary module that a student has to do.

Core module Compulsory learning required in situations contextually relevant to a particular qualification.

Elective module A selection of additional credits from which a choice may be made to ensure that the purpose of the qualification is achieved.

Fundamental or Core module A module of which the learning forms the basis or foundation for the education required to

obtain the qualification.

Credit The recognition obtained when a student passes examinations or tests to comply with conditions for completion of a qualification.

Semester A study period extending to half of the academic year.

Academic year A specified period given for the academic activities of a specific year, consisting of two semesters.

Distinction A final mark of 75% or more achieved in a module/ course.

Exemption Students do not have to take examinations in a module, e.g. promoting a module.

International student A student who is not a South African citizen.

Syllabus The content of the module/course.

Predicate Total semester mark that determines whether or not a student can take an exam (as per faculty requirement).

Prerequisites The requirements for admission to a module, as stated in the general rules of the faculty.

Plagiarism When you use someone's words without acknowledging them.

Graduation The receiving or conferring of an academic degree or diploma.

Academic A teacher or scholar in a university or other institute of higher education.

Professor A university academic of the highest rank.

Lecturer A person that educates at an institution of higher learning.

Dean The head of a faculty.

Vice-Chancellor A person who is the principal of the university. Deputy Vice-Chancellor Person who is second in charge

under the Vice-Chancellor. You will hear people say 'DVC'.

HOD Head of Department.

MBA Master of Business Administration.

RPL Recognition of Prior Learning.

Registrar Responsible for student administration and institutional governance.

Senate The body that governs academic policies and procedures in respect of teaching, learning, research and academic functions.

SRC Student Representative Council.

NSFAS National Student Financial Aid Scheme, a bursary scheme enabling students to fund their studies.

Faculty A collection of departments focusing on similar divisions of knowledge.

Faculty Manager A manager of the faculty. The person you contact when you need to make any enquiries with regard to your studies.

Undergraduate When you are doing your diploma or degree. A university student who has not obtained any degree or diploma. **Postgraduate** What you become after you complete your degree. Postgraduate is also used to refer to an honours, master's, PhD, or postdoctoral degree studied after obtaining an undergraduate degree, i.e. postgraduate degree.

Degree A qualification awarded to a student for successful completion of a course.

Academia The environment or community concerned with the pursuit of research, education, and scholarship, such as a university. Other words with the same meaning include 'educational, intellectual, scholarly, and scholastic'.

BA Bachelor of Arts degree.

BComm Bachelor of Commerce degree.

BSc Bachelor of Science degree.

Hons Honours degree. A degree that follows an undergraduate degree.

MB ChB Medical degree.

MA A degree that follows an honours degree.

PhD A PhD is a degree awarded to people who have done advanced research into a particular subject. PhD is an abbreviation for 'Doctor of Philosophy'.

Postdoc A postdoctoral or postdoc is a person professionally conducting research after the completion of their doctoral studies.
