# Expected outcomes of the conference

The conference will also inform SARUA's future initiatives and contribute to building a sustainable higher education ecosystem in Southern Africa.

### PROF. ROMEELA MOHEE Commissioner of the Higher Education Commission in Mauritius



Prof. Mohee, CSK, is the current commissioner of the Higher Education Commission in Mauritius, overseeing the regulation of public and private higher education institutions. She holds an engineering degree in energy and environment from La Grande Ecole d'ingénieurs, Institut National des Sciences Appliquées Lyon, France and a PhD from the University of Mauritius.

With 34 years in education, Prof. Mohee has served as professor, head of department in chemical and environmental engineering, dean of the Faculty of Engineering, pro-vice-chancellor, and vice-chancellor of the University of Mauritius from 2013 to 2016. She was also the national research chair in solid waste at the Mauritius Research and Innovation Council.

An expert in higher education development, she worked at the Commonwealth of Learning from 2017 to 2020, advising on e-learning, quality assurance and employability. She has published over 150 research papers and supervised more than 80 students at undergraduate, master's and doctoral levels.

Prof. Mohee's contributions have earned her several awards, including the African Union's Best Woman Scientist Award in 2009. She is a fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry, UK and the Mauritius Academy of Science and Technology, Honorary Fellow of the Institute of Chemical Engineers UK and an associate members of the International Association of Universities.

PROF. JOUHAINA GHERIB VC Manouba University, Tunisia and VP IAU



Prof. Gherib is a professor of strategic management at the University of Manouba (UMA) in Tunisia, where she holds a PhD from the University Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne. Her research focuses on strategic decision-making, social responsibility, and the SDGs. She currently holds the UNESCO Chair on 'Higher Education for Sustainable Development in Africa' at UMA.

In 2011, Prof. Gherib was elected vice-rector for Research and International Relations, and in 2017, she became UMA's sixth rector, re-elected in 2020 for a second term. She made history as the first woman in Tunisia to hold this position. As rector, she worked to increase the visibility of the university's research and align its education quality with international standards, while prioritising the well-being of the university community.

Prof. Gherib has chaired several committees focused on reforming Tunisia's higher education and research system and was awarded the Knight of the National Order of Merit in Education in 2019. Actively engaged in civil society, she served as executive director of the United Nations Global Compact Network Tunisia from its inception and has been elected vice president of the International Association of Universities, leading its working group on higher education and research for sustainable development.



# DR ANDRÉE SURSOCK European University Association



Dr Sursock is senior adviser and former deputy secretary general (2001–2009) of the European University Association (EUA), where she led policy development on quality assurance. She directed the EUA's Institutional Evaluation Programme and played a key role in shaping European higher education standards, including the Standards and Guidelines for Quality Assurance (ESG), the European Quality Assurance Register (EQAR) and the launch of the European Quality Assurance Forum (EQAF).

Since 2009, Dr Sursock has advised universities and governments internationally on a range of higher education policies. She served on three commissions that allocated funding for the French Academic Excellence Initiative and is an active member of advisory and administrative boards of universities and quality assurance agencies.

Her research and publications focus on topics such as diversity and inclusion, student access and success, university governance, quality assurance, internationalisation, doctoral education, academic careers and community engagement.

Dr Sursock holds a first degree in political philosophy from Université Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne and a PhD in anthropology from the University of California, Berkeley.

PROF. ROBIN SANNASSEE SADC Secretariat



Dr Raja Vinesh (Robin) Sannassee is currently the senior programme officer for education and skills development at the SADC Secretariat, where he leads the development and implementation of regional education programmes across 16 SADC Member States. His portfolio spans basic education, TVET, higher education, and open and distance learning (ODL).

Before joining the SADC Secretariat, Robin served as professor of international finance and trade at the University of Mauritius, where he was also dean of the Faculty of Finance (2014–2017). In 2018, he held the position of academic director at the Open University of Mauritius.

Robin earned his PhD in Economics from the University of Reading, UK. As a former WTO Chair for six years, he has published extensively in finance, economics and trade. He has also consulted for major international organisations, including the World Bank, UNDP, UNCTAD, UNECA, COL and the African Development Bank (AfDB).




DR PETER WELLS







### **VISA REQUIREMENTS:**

- Entry into Zambia via Lusaka International Airport requires a passport that is valid for more than six months upon entry to the country. The exemption or the method of obtaining the visa depends on the nationality of the traveller. You can either be exempted or have to apply online for an e-Visa or be allowed to obtain your visa upon your arrival in Lusaka.
- Visitors from very few countries require a visa to enter Zambia.

### **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:**

Check with your travel clinic which vaccinations are mandatory as these can change.

Vaccinations generally recommended by the World Health Organization and US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) include:

- Hepatitis A
- Typhoid
- Tetanus
- Meningitis
- Rabies

#### **INSURANCE**

There's currently no legal requirement to take out travel insurance for travel to or through Zambia. However, regardless of whether it's legally required, it's always a good idea to take our health insurance before you travel – whether to Zambia or anywhere else.

### TRAVEL AND TRANSPORTATION

- Kenneth Kaunda International Airport serves the city of Lusaka
- Taxis are available 24 hours a day at Kenneth Kaunda International Airport. They have an orange band so that they are easily identifiable.
- Several car rental companies offer their services in Zambia. Some of them have an office in the airport where you can hire a car on arrival.
- Several companies offer VIP transport service at the airport.
- Many hotels offer a shuttle service, so be sure to enquire when you book your accommodation.






### Currency, banking and payment tips

- National currency: Zambian kwacha
  - 1 Zambian kwacha = 0,66 South African rand
  - 1 Zambian kwacha = 0,036 US dollar
  - 1 Zambian kwacha = 0,034 euro
- The kwacha is typically used for all domestic transactions.
- Credit cards are accepted but they are mostly used in high-end dining establishments, hotels and a few stores. Visa and Mastercard are the most accepted cards.
- ATMs are available in cities and towns and allow you to withdraw kwacha using international credit or debit cards, though transaction fees may apply. It's advisable to carry some local currency for smaller purchases, transportation, and tipping, as card payments may not always be an option. Always inform your bank of your travel plans to avoid issues with international transactions and consider carrying a backup payment method for added security.
- Tipping in Zambia is generally appreciated, though not always expected. 10–15% is reasonable in a restaurant while a ZKW5–10 would be appreciate by a taxi driver and ZKW10–20 would be appropriate for a porter.





### Climate info

May is an ideal time to visit Lusaka for a conference, with mild temperatures ranging from 15°C in the mornings to 25°C during the day. The weather is dry and comfortable, so light layers are recommended, along with a jacket for cooler mornings and evenings. The lower humidity makes it a pleasant time for outdoor activities and sightseeing after the conference.

### Plugging in



In Zambia, power plugs and sockets (outlets) of type C, type D and type G are used. The standard voltage is 230 V at a frequency of 50 Hz.



### Local attractions and cultural information

### **LOCAL ATTRACTIONS**

- Lusaka National Museum: This museum is a great spot for those interested in Zambia's history, culture, and art.
- Munda Wanga Environmental Park: A beautiful sanctuary for wildlife, Munda Wanga includes a zoo, botanical garden, and nature reserve.
- Freedom Statue: Located in the heart of Lusaka, the Freedom Statue commemorates Zambia's independence from British colonial rule in 1964.
- Zambia National Park: Lusaka's proximity to national parks like Lower Zambezi National Park makes it a great base from which to organise safaris and wildlife viewing experiences.

#### **CULTURAL INFORMATION**

- Etiquette is an essential aspect of Zambian culture, and it is important to observe the local customs and traditions when visiting the country. One of the most important aspects of Zambian etiquette is respect for elders and those in positions of authority. It is customary to address older people and those in positions of authority with titles such as Mr, Mrs or Miss and to show deference and respect in their presence.
- Another important aspect of Zambian etiquette is dress code. In Zambia, it is customary to dress modestly, especially when visiting religious sites or attending formal events. Women are expected to cover their shoulders and wear skirts or dresses that cover their knees, while men are expected to wear long pants and shirts with sleeves.

### 1. SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT OPTIONS
